

SUMMARY S-H PROJECTS TOLD

Fred Schmidt Shows Largest Net Profit in School Vocation Class

SILVERTON, March 8.—The summarized final project report of each pupil's home project of the Silverton Smith-Hughes department for the year has been completed. It shows that 37 boys have completed their projects which number 64, some of the boys having as many as four projects apiece.

Dairying and poultry shared popularity, with 11 projects in each. There were seven swine projects, four of sheep, eight of corn, six of potatoes and berries, grain, truck gardening, bees and miscellaneous.

Some Work in "Red"

In dairying there were seven projects in the "red" and in poultry there were but six projects showing losses. Of the eight corn projects three showed losses. The reports show, however, that the boys allowed themselves a fair wage and when the wage is subtracted from the losses there were only five projects of the total 64.

The largest net profit, which allowed for wages, was the field-crop corn project of Fred Schmidt, whose project showed a profit of \$327.57. His total profit, allowing wages for his own labor, amounted to \$343.07.

Makes Money on Spuds

Clifton Hadley, who was registered in poultry and horticulture showed a net profit of \$280.31 in his potato project.

The total net profit for all of the boys in the department showed \$1189.79, with \$1366.72 allowed for the labor making a total profit above all expenses excepting that which the boys allowed themselves for their own labor, of \$2556.51.

Many of the parents of the boys who are registered in the Silverton department, have expressed great satisfaction in the "business - agriculture" taught their sons.

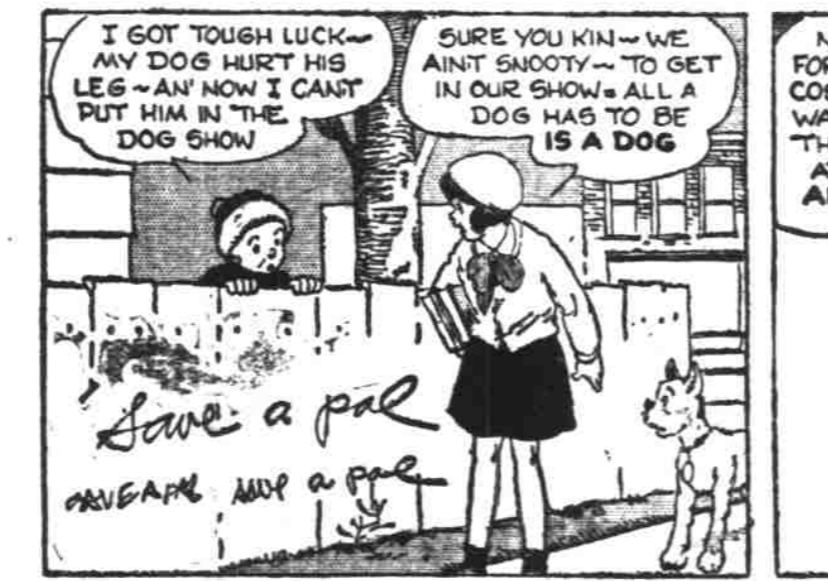

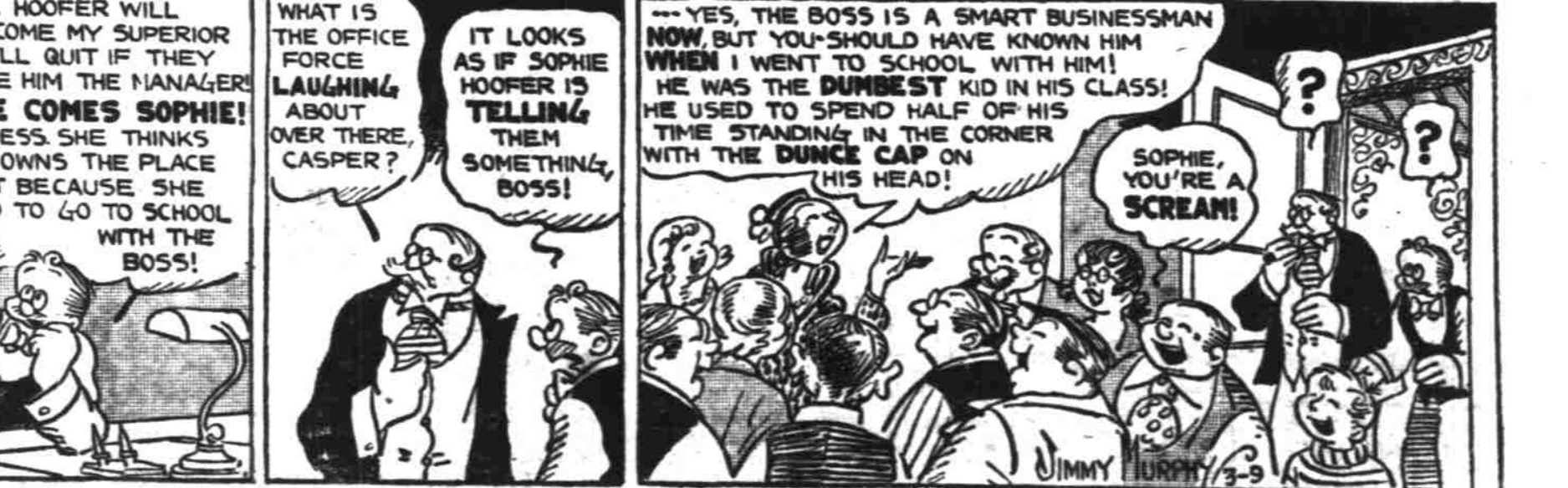

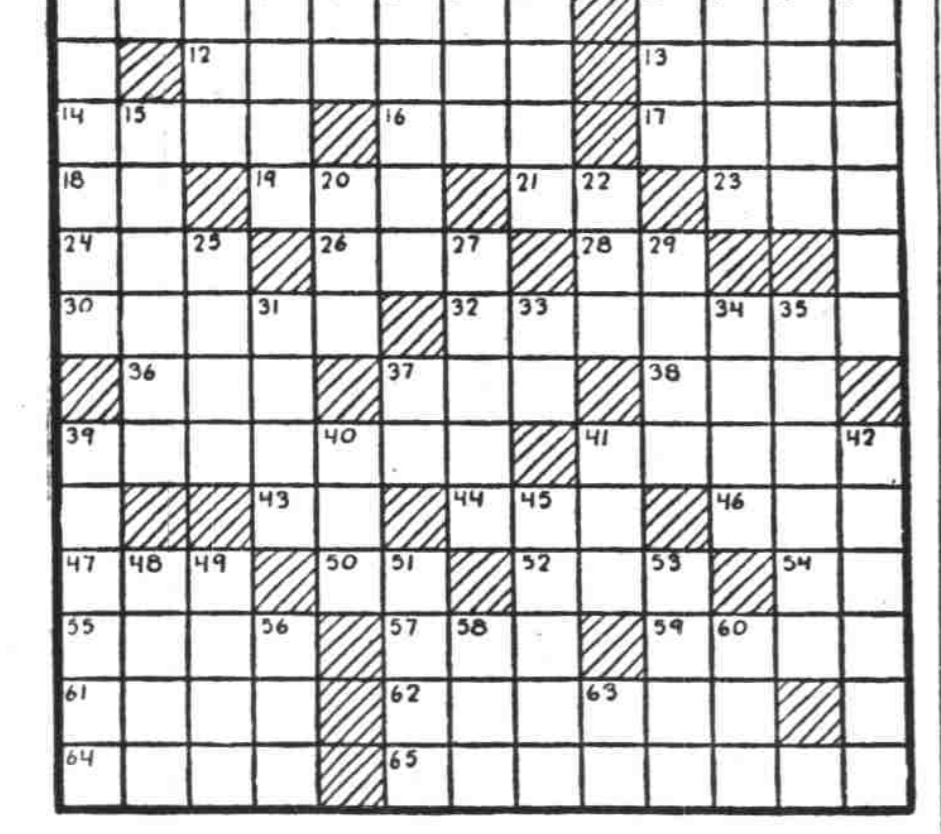
