

# Trojans Win 39-28, Force Titular Series to Third Game

## SOUTHERN FIVE SETS FAST PACE

### Nemer and Guttero Tally in Rapid Fashion; Beavers Rally, Second Half

CORVALLIS, Ore., March 11.—(AP)—University of Southern California evened the Pacific coast conference basketball championship series by defeating Oregon State College, 39 to 28, here tonight. The Staters won the game last night, 35 to 33.

The Trojans, led by Captain Nemer, set a much faster pace than they did last night, and raced to a 12 to 10 lead before the northern division champions began to function effectively. Nemer accounted for 16 points, to be high scorer of the game.

Starting the second half with the score 20 to 10 against them, the Orangemen staged an offensive that brought them within four points of their opponents, but the accurate shooting of the Trojans soon gave them a safe lead.

Southern California's victory tonight made necessary a third and final game, which will be played here Monday night.

Guttero started the scoring with a tip-in shot in the opening minute. The Trojans ran the score to 6 before the Orangemen tallied on a free throw; then took 6 more before a gain. Davis made the first basket for the home team. The visitors gave a brilliant exhibition throughout, while the Staters were distinctly off compared with last night.

Captain Lewis led the Oregon State rally in the second half, when shots by him, Taylor, and O'Connell narrowed the scoring gap to four points, 25 to 21, the greatest the Staters were able to get throughout the game.

Nemer sinking them in from 15 angles and Guttero alternating high fast shots formed a scoring combination that was too much tonight for the Orangemen. The honors were about even on free throws, the Trojans making 9 out of 12 tries and the Beavers 9 out of 15.

With a diminutive forward named Barnes flipping the ball through the hoop consistently from far out on the floor, the hard fighting Albany team took a 4 to 0 lead early in the game, lost the lead 6-5 at the first quarter, then went ahead to 11-6 and 13-10 at half time.

Captain Harold Davis of Silverton sent his boys out with the fire needed to win after the rest period, but now his boys seemed to be over-anxious; they went ahead immediately but soon fell behind again and were trailing 17-15 at the final quarter opened.

The "Technocracy" Scott, elongated Silverton forward who had been missing most of his shots along with all of his mates, fired up just a little more and began dashing into a range at which he could not miss, and with some help from Oren, showed Silverton ahead 21 to 17. Albany came within two points of knocking it up again in the last two minutes, but Scott looped a final shot that gave the Marion county boys a four-point margin.

The Trojans, according to our special operator No. 43, didn't pull any of that excessively rough basketball which is said to be the rule in California, the first night at Corvallis; presumably they had been working for a couple of weeks to get the hang of northern style ball. They did have one little trick that was new to northern fans. When one of the Beavers got past his guard and was sure to score, the guard would reach out and foul him, not too severely, before the shot could be made; that would entitle only one free throw and the field shot, though made, wouldn't count because the foul occurred before the Beaver started to shoot. Five shots that went through the hoop were thus nullified. The free throws were made. Of course such tactics mean a personal foul chalked up against somebody, but they figure it pays nevertheless.

Jerry Nemer, our operative adds, was all of the great basketball player he was advertised to be; and had "basketball sense" to such a degree that although Ed Lewis took the tipoff consistently from "rubber legs" Guttero, Nemer was on the spot to retrieve the ball more than half the time.

## AGED SENATOR DIES, NATIONAL CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, March 11.—(AP)—Senator Robert H. Howell, 89 year old Republican from Omaha, Neb., died at Walter Reed hospital today after a long week's illness.

The aged legislator, who was serving his second term in the senate after a varied career as naval officer, law student, real estate operator, manager of municipal-owned utilities and state senator, was a victim of a heart attack growing out of pneumonia and complications.

Senator Norris, Howells' successor, announced his death to the senate. Resolutions expressing "profound sorrow and sympathy" were adopted and an adjournment taken until Monday.

The funeral will be held at Omaha Tuesday.

Senator Borah (Rep., Idaho) said Howells was a most enthusiastic industrialist and statesman and his death was a distinct loss to the senate and country.
