FORMER PRESIDENT STARTS FOR HOME

NEW YORK, March 16—(AP)—

Former President Herbert Hoover started tonight for his home in Palo Alto, Calif.

Accompanied by his son, Allan, and Lawrence Richey, his secretary, Mr. Hoover left on the Broadway Limited of the Pennsylvania system. The former president, who has been here attending to personal business affairs since he arrived from Washington March 4, will stop over tomorrow in Chicago and spend the night with friends. Richey said Mr. Hoover would return to New York within six weeks to two months to wind up his business affairs.

REFUGEES SEEKING SHELTER FROM RAIN

Use Boxcars for Homeless in Earthquake Area; Many are fed

LONG BEACH, Cal., March 16.

(AP) — Showers were added late today to troubles of earthquake "refugees" in Long Beach and Compton.

More than 3000 persons, most of whose homes were seriously damaged in Friday's earthquake, are still being cared for by the Red Cross in camps in Long Beach parks. Many thousands others have been fed because of lack of fuel in their homes.

As rain threatened, D. W. Pontius, president of the Pacific Electric Railroad company, had 100 box cars moved into this area as makeshift shelter tonight for those not accommodated by tents.

From a preliminary survey of the entire area in which 116 lives were lost and more than \$60,000,000 damage done, the Red Cross estimated today 2100 homes were ruined and 21,000 damaged in varying degrees.

Depending on contributions to its funds, the Red Cross is concentrating on hospitalization, feeding and housing of quake victims, while other agencies seek funds for rehabilitation of business areas.

The organization announced that an incomplete survey of the region from Santa Ana to Laguna Beach showed 1800 persons still in need of aid.

At Los Angeles, the county board of supervisors ordered a stringent ordinance drafted to require all future construction in the county to be "earthquake proof."

state police, said Banks told him: "I shot Prescott, who was trying to force his way into my house as any burglar would."

L. E. Finch, prominent figure in the "Good Government congress," of which Banks was honorary president, was rushed to a hospital here shortly after the slaying, where he was treated for cuts and bruises inflicted, he said, when an opponent of the congress struck him over the head with the butt of a pistol.

Seven More Men Put Under Arrest

Arrests made today in connection with the ballot thefts included Joe Croft, C. J. Connors, Virgil Edington, John Glenn and Orville Martin. T. L. Brechen and C. W. Davis were still held in the Grants Pass jail on similar charges.

Rev. Edwin K. Malkemus and Joseph Bunch, members of the "Good Government congress," were arrested tonight on warrants charging them with criminal syndicalism. The arrests were understood to have been made in connection with their activities in the congress.

The county commissioners tonight named Fred Kelley as special county jailer, and arrangements were being made to transfer all persons arrested in connection with the ballot thefts from the city to the county jail.

State penitentiary officials early this morning stated they had not yet received advices that Llewellyn Banks might be brought to the local institution for safekeeping.

Superintendent of Police Charles P. Pray kept in close touch with the Medford situation all day yesterday. He dispatched three officers from Salem and two from Eugene to supplement the southern Oregon force. Reports received in the afternoon indicated that conditions were quieting down and that the officers had matters well in hand.

Mrs. Nora Henderson, employe in the secretary of state's office, daughter of George Prescott, victim of Banks' shot, left for Medford yesterday on receipt of word of her father's death.

Heavy profit taking kept the market in check today, but in several instances, yesterday's gains were extended by \$1 to \$4 a share.

Turnover of 3,301,985 shares was the largest since September. The pace quickened in the bond market too, with a turnover of \$14,953,000 par value, against \$12,566,000 Wednesday. Many issues rose \$10 to \$50 or more per bond of \$1000 par value, with U. S. government issues again gaining striking gains for these normally narrow money issues. Some were up \$10 to \$20 per \$1000 bond.

Provisions of the Smith cotton option contract plan, given a pocket veto by President Hoover, were incorporated in the measure, as were modifications of the original domestic allotment plan. The commodities which the program is intended to reach are cotton, wheat, corn, hogs, cattle, sheep, rice, tobacco, milk and its products.

WIEMES BURNED AS PAINT GUN BURSTS

Walter Wiemes, son of Frank Wiemes, 1431 North Cottage street, suffered painful but not serious burns about the face and neck at his home yesterday afternoon when a pressure paint spray outfit he was using exploded and burst into flames. He rushed from the rear of the house, his clothing aflame.

Persons coming to his aid rolled him on the ground to put out the flames. He was taken to Salem general hospital where last night he was reported resting comfortably.

Considerable damage was done to the annex to the house, where Wiemes was refinishing some furniture, firemen reported. Both chemicals and water were required to extinguish the fire.

Doo-Dad Menaces Are Taken From L.A. Structures

LOS ANGELES, March 16.

(AP) — Architectural finery received a stiff blow tonight when the board of education issued an edict saying: "Down with all doo-dads."

The order went out to a large force of men engaged in reconstructing Los Angeles schools damaged in the earthquakes. Cement ball, cast stone angels, concrete thing-a-ma-jigs and the like, which adorn school doorways and cornices will be removed.

SUIT STARTED TO TEST VALIDITY OF RELIEF BONDS

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 16

(AP)—The promised court action to test the validity of the 1933 legislative act authorizing the state to issue \$10,000,000 in bonds to meet an unemployment relief emergency was instituted today by Attorney General G. W. Hamilton.

A suit to permanently enjoin the state finance committee, comprising Gov. Clarence D. Martin, Auditor Cliff Yelle and Treasurer Otto Case, from issuing and selling the bonds was filed in the Thurston county superior court by Assistant Attorney General John W. Hanna, acting for Hamilton.

ECONOMY MEASURE PASSED BY HOUSE

WASHINGTON, March 16.

(AP) — Congress today gave President Roosevelt extraordinary powers to slash government expenditures and veterans' gratuities a half a billion dollars, as the first complete move of the extra session drive to balance the budget.

Final action came in the house. By a tremendous vote of 373 to 19, it accepted senate amendments reducing the expected savings on veterans' compensation between \$10,000,000 and \$25,000,000.


Democratic leaders announced the senate amendments liberalizing the provisions were acceptable to the president. The bill will go to the White House tomorrow for President Roosevelt's signature.

Twelve democrats, including Representative Cullen of New York, Tammany leader and assistant party leader, three republicans and four farmer-laborites voted against the measure.
