road from Odell lake north to Waldo lake, to connect with the present north fork road.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—A two-hour White House conference tonight failed to produce strong opposition to President Roosevelt's restoration employment plan, but congressional leaders forecast approval of the legislation possibly next week.

The president called together a majority of the senate and house labor committees after finding that opposition to his plan had developed to the point where Representative Connery (D. Mass.), succeeded in forcing joint hearings by the house and senate groups on the proposal.

Although Connery said as he left the White House that as chairman of the house committee he "still cannot support the bill in its present form," Senator Walsh (D. Mass.), chairman of the senate labor committee, told newsmen:

"There is no doubt that the bill will be enacted substantially as recommended next week."

Connery had offered various compromises for parts of the measure to which he objected, but these, he said, were not received favorably. One would have guaranteed \$50 a month to single and \$80 a month to married men among the 250,000 the president expects to put to work in reforestation.

Another would have substituted other language for the portion of the bill that authorizes the president to "select" recruits for the new "conservation corps."

The word "select," Connery said, was "used in the war draft, and with it in this bill the president could draft his workers."

Portland Public Market First to Get R.F.C. Aid

PORTLAND, Ore., March 22.—(AP)—Construction of a public market here at a cost of \$1,400,000 will be started about April 10, Ralph H. Calk, attorney for the company undertaking the project, announced today. Calk said that his organization was the first private company to receive a loan from the reconstruction finance corporation, and that it will be the first public market project so financed.

C. Leo Wilson, president and general manager of the company, said about 500 men will be employed either directly or indirectly on the project for six months. As soon as the papers involved are received here and approved by the Securities Savings and Trust company, the \$750,000 issue of first mortgage serial bonds will be bought by the reconstruction finance corporation. Wilson said the remainder of the project has been financed. It is expected the market will be ready for occupancy early next fall.

Prineville Plans To License Beer

PRINEVILLE, Ore., March 22.—(AP)—The city council here last night drew up an ordinance to permit the sale of beer in its original containers by any recognized business organization or for consumption on the premises of any recognized restaurant. Fee for the former method of dispensing would be \$10, and for the latter \$25.

160 Men Go to Work on Relief Jobs This Week

One hundred sixty men have been sent out from the U.S. Y.M.C.A. Employment office to county relief road jobs this week, Assistant Manager D. D. Dotson reported yesterday. While eventual plans are to place the hiring of men entirely in Dotson's hands, work orders this week are still being handled through the Red Cross office.

A considerable number of persons have inquired at the employment office about garden lots available in Salem. Dotson has over 300 plots listed.

Moonlight Plan Saves City \$406 Cash, 126 Hours

The moonlight street illumination schedule tried out here during December netted the city a saving of \$406 in money and 126½ hours in time, according to a report made by the Portland Electric Power company to Alderman F. L. Wilkinson, chairman of the city council's light committee. No decision has been reached as to making the economy lighting plan effective the remainder of this year. Under the plan, street corner lights were extinguished on nights when moonlight provided sufficient illumination.

Relief in Ohio Expected as Mississippi Rises and Residents Decamp

waters retreated today was deemed by authorities the greatest present danger.

Precaution also was taken to prevent any epidemics of disease. In Dayton, Ky., across the river from Cincinnati, school children received large doses of Cod Liver oil.

The flood waters ebbed away here, and although slowly, brought cheer to Cincinnati and to other communities more than a hundred miles upstream. In that area, the Ohio generally marked time, held back by the great volume of water that bogged in the tri-state area of Ohio, Kentucky and Indiana. From the latter district downstream the situation was one of increasing distress.

It will be another week, the weather bureau said, before the worst of the flood is felt in southern Indiana, Kentucky and Illinois.

As it retreated in the upstream area, the Ohio and its tributaries snatched two more lives today. Near Portsmouth, Ohio, Louis Mitchell, 15, feared his skiff would sink in a turbulent creek, and grabbed at a dangling wire. It was a power line and the shock killed him instantly.

At Zanesville, Ohio, Mrs. Caroline Heinle, 65, was found drowned in a backwater. These deaths put the known toll of the flood at 12 lives, in addition to unestimated damage to property.

Tiny to Try Triple Wing Grid Layout

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., March 22.—(AP)—Pacific coast football fans will have a new formation to mystify them next fall if "Tiny" Thornhill, new Stanford coach, proves successful.

Thornhill sees potentialities in adding a triple wingback lineup to the system introduced here by Glenn Warner, who left to coach Temple university.

Coach Thornhill will try it out when spring practice opens April 5. While similar to Warner's noted "Formation A," the triple wingback setup allows an even wider group of plays to evolve from it than do the single and double wing formations.

As in the "A" formation, it has an unbalanced line with the halfbacks one yard outside the ends and the fullback three and one-half yards behind center. It differs from "A" in that the end on the long side is split about a yard, with the quarterback playing just behind that opening.

Thornhill said he had not heard of the formation being used before on the coast but that Coach McLaughry of Brown university has been an exponent of it for several years.

KIDNAPING PLOT IN MEDFORD CLAIMED

MEDFORD, Ore., March 22.—(AP)—Information of an alleged conspiracy to kidnap District Attorney George Coddling, Deputy District Attorney George Nelson and another unnamed Jackson county official was contained in affidavits mentioned by county officers here today as they endeavored to coordinate facts in the reputed abduction case.

The "ransom" that was to have been demanded, the officers said, was the resignations of the three men held.

Although county and state police declined to disclose the names of persons alleged to have signed the affidavits, they said they learned that a meeting at which the kidnaping was discussed was held at the home of Llewellyn A. Banks, former Medford editor, who is held in jail charged with first degree murder for the slaying of Constable George Prescott.

Members of the so-called "Good Government Congress," organized by Banks, attended the meeting, police said, and many were drawn from the jail population when the alleged kidnaping plot was broached.

No Food No Beer Hoosiers Slogan Under New Deal

INDIANAPOLIS, March 22.—(AP)—Hoosiers who drink beer in public places will have to order bologna, rye bread or other food with the beverage.

A law passed recently provides that beer can be dispensed in public only in connection with the consumption of food.

There will be no keg beer. A case of 24 pints may be purchased at one time for home consumption.

Beer, under the new state statute, can be served only in restaurants, clubs, dining cars and in dining rooms on boats.

Restaurants must really be all they are supposed to be, and not "saloons in disguise," Paul Fry, excise director, said today.

Mortgage Relief Next on Program

WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—The next card in the Roosevelt new deal will be a proposal to congress for complete refinancing of the mortgages held by farmers and small home owners.

President Roosevelt will follow this measure with proposals already taking shape for federal control over the stock exchanges and reorganization of the railroads.

RELIEF WAREHOUSE DOES BIG BUSINESS

Variety of Goods Handled, Over 100 "Customers" Served Each day

Supplying 37 articles of food, also clothing and shoes, to an average of well over 100 persons a day, the relief warehouse maintained at 147 North Front street by Community Service, Marion county and the Red Cross presents the appearance of a busy, though roughly fitted, small country department store. A dozen men, taken from the unemployed ranks, do the clerking, record-keeping, sacking and shoe-repairing.

Recent rearrangements in the warehouse give more efficient handling of products and "customers." The shoe repair shop has been moved to a well-lighted corner room at the front, and the commissary department has been fitted with a long counter and spacious shelves, with storage and sacking space directly behind it. Rooms on the north side contain the new and used clothing, while the rear room is used for storing vegetables, flour and other bulky goods.

The variety of foodstuffs in stock is wide: Flour, canned and dried prunes, potatoes, onions, apples, canned tomatoes, loganberries, strawberries, string beans, milk and salmon; dry beans, carrots, sugar, salt, pepper, cocoa, tea, coffee, rice, cereals, graham flour, rolled oats, yellow and white corn meal, oleomargarine, butter, peanut butter, laundry soap, yeast, soda, lard, bacon, fresh beef, sauerkraut, eggs, kerosene and matches.

The busiest day this winter was a week ago Saturday, when 205 persons were served. One hundred fifty orders is no unusual day's business. No food or wearing apparel is given without a requisition from the relief office.

Civic leaders supervising the warehouse hope that the new plan of giving workers on relief projects requisitions good for food at any store in the county will result only for needy persons unable to work. This will relieve them of many hours' work and in addition take the warehouse out of competition with the grocers.

Milton L. Meyers and T. A. Windishar are directly in charge of the warehouse, along with the county court and other Community Service directors.

Meeker Dies in Chair; Slaying Of Wife Denied

COLUMBUS, O., March 22.—(AP)—Claiming innocence to the end, Herbert Meeker, young Ohio farmer, was electrocuted at Ohio penitentiary tonight for the slaying of his wife, Gertrude.

Mrs. Meeker's body, nude and bruised, was found May 8, 1932, near Millersburg, Ohio. She had been beaten to death.

Meeker admitted he was present at the killing, but said the crime was committed by Howard Young, a relative. Young committed suicide when officers went to arrest him.

Mitchell Case To be Rushed; Deadline Near

NEW YORK, March 22.—(AP)—Racing against the statute of limitations, United States Attorney George J. Medalla laid before a federal grand jury today the case of Charles E. Mitchell, who was arrested last night on a charge of evading a \$657,152 income tax in 1929.

With a painstaking investigation completed into a transaction by which Mitchell said he sold a block of National City bank stock to his wife at a loss of \$2,800,000, the authorities made speed their watchword. In the case of at least one of the charges against the grey-haired banker the statute of limitations will apply in about three weeks.

\$24,000 Payment On Bonds Faces City Government

The city of Salem faces final payment May 1 of \$24,000 principal and \$600 interest on a 20-year sewer bond issue with prospects of available cash yet uncertain. City Treasurer C. O. Rice said yesterday. The payment was included in the city budget but whether or not the cash will be in the treasury at that time depends on tax payments between now and the due date.

The total issue, payable serially, was for \$480,000 at 5 per cent interest.
