D. A. R. Convention Eugene Wednesday

Salem Daughters of the American Revolution are making ready for the state convention which will meet in Eugene beginning with the 1:30 o'clock board meeting in the Masonic temple Wednesday afternoon.

With this meeting the 20th anniversary of the organization of the Oregon D. A. R. will be observed. Mrs. C. S. Jackson often called the D. A. R. Mother of Oregon, will give reminiscences of early meeting at the luncheon meeting Thursday.

Formal opening of the conference is scheduled for 7:30 p. m. Wednesday, when the processional ball will be led by state officers, escorted by pages, honored guests and the state presidents of patriotic and genealogical societies in Oregon. Colonel William H. Patterson, United States army, will give an address on "Historical Events Leading Up to the World War," illustrating with slides. A reception to state officers will follow.
