Mrs. Scott became a resident of China in 1919 and has lived in close contact with conditions there for more than 10 years. She told her listeners that the women in China are the ones who are awakening to the needed changes there and that this has come about mostly through the women who have gone abroad to study, and have come home again with the information which they gave to their sisters.

Women are taking advanced places in professional life in China and in one instance are perhaps unique in that in Shanghai there is a "Women's Bank" by name and which is entirely run by women.

Mrs. Scott told her listeners that the accounts given of China by Pearl Buck in her books are not at all exaggerated.
