

FINAL RITES HELD FOR EARLY TEACHER

William Parker, Polk County Pedagog and Prominent Mason Dies

MONMOUTH, March 30 — William Parker, 71, of Portland, a Polk county school teacher of more than 40 years ago, died Tuesday at his home. He had been ill since January.

Born March 28, 1862 in London, England, he came to Toronto, Canada when about five years old. He came to Oregon in 1889, and taught his first school in this state at Elkins near Monmouth. Later he taught at Falls City, Ballston, Hazel Dell and Dallas, all in Polk county. From there he went to Woodburn and Silverton

and between 1907 and 1933 he was principal successively of the Almsworth, Vernon, Albina-Homesstead and Oregon schools of Portland. At the time of his death he was president of the Portland teachers' retirement fund.

He was a member of several Masonic groups, the Alberta Lodge, Gul Reazee groto, the Shrine, the Court of Honor and the Past Master and Wardens' association, and of the Woodmen of the World and the Macabees lodge.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Annie E. Parker; two daughters, Miss Juanita V. Parker and Mrs. Helen A. Dandell, all of Portland; five sisters in Canada, and two brothers, Archie Parker of Monmouth; and John G. Parker of Toronto.

Funeral services were held today at the Pearson Funeral chapel with Rev. P. M. Blenkinsop officiating. Judge Wallace McCamant also spoke. Commitment services were held in the Portland Crematorium.

LEGION TO SPONSOR SILVERTON SCRIP

Because Chamber not Incorporated; First Issue Slated April 6

SILVERTON, March 30 — Silverton scrip will be issued by the Delbert Reeves Post of the American Legion instead of by the Silverton chamber of commerce as was at first planned. The matter came up Wednesday when it was learned that in order to issue scrip the sponsor had to be incorporated. The chamber of commerce is not incorporated.

The local post of the American Legion came to the fore and at a called meeting Wednesday night of the ways and means committee and of the executive committee plans were made for the issuance of the Silverton scrip. Plans, which were made by the board of directors of the chamber of commerce will be carried out. A Coddage company will be the trustee of the scrip as it was for the chamber.

Likely the scrip will bear the signature of Charles Reynolds,

James Barth is chairman of the committee making the arrangements. Serving with him are Ernest Starr and Roy Davenport. The group announced Thursday morning that the scrip would be issued as soon as possible and that very likely it would be in use by April 6.

FEDERAL FEES FOR BEER PERMIT TOLD

\$20 for Retailer; Those Starting in April to Pay \$5 Till July

First advices sent out from the Portland internal revenue office on licenses for dispensation of the new 3.2 beer have been received by Paul H. Hauser, deputy revenue collector here.

Any dispenser selling more than five gallons of the fermented beverage at one time will be classed as a wholesaler, and will be liable for a \$50 per year license, covering the year from July 1, 1933, to June 30, 1934.

Dispensers selling five gallons or less at one time will come under the retail end, and must pay a \$20 annual license to the Portland revenue office.

Druggists paying a special tax as retail liquor dealers at the rate of \$25 per year may sell fermented liquor without payment of a further tax as retail dealer. If as many officers on the police force as there are now.

druggists sell five gallons or more at a time, they will be liable for the \$50 wholesale tax.

Taxes will be due July 1, for the year ending June 30, 1934. Failure to pay brings a 25 per cent addition to the tax, and other penalty.

Retail dispensers starting selling beer in April will be taxed \$5 for the period until July 1; those starting retail sale in May, will pay a \$3.34 tax; and in June, \$1.67 tax. Wholesale tax for the three months prior to July 1 will be \$12.50 if sale is started in April; \$8.34, if in May; and \$4.17 if in June.

SILVERTON, March 30 — Two of the medals of the American Legion gallery championship events of the second series of winter postal rifle and pistol matches, went to Silverton according to the announcement of the National Rifle association. Sgt. O. W. Olsen received a bronze medal for placing fourth with a score of 568 which was within nine points of the high score in the individual event.

Harry Riches and O. W. Olsen placed 4th in the two man team shoot, the team scoring 1094.
