\$20 for Retailer: Those Starting in April to Pay \$5 Till July

First advices sent out from the Portland internal revenue office on licenses for dispensation of the new 3.2 beer have been received by Paul H. Hauser, deputy revenue collector here.

Any dispenser selling more than five gallons of the fermented beverage at one time will be class ed as a wholesaler, and will be it able for a \$50 per year license, covering the year from July 1, 1933, to June 30, 1934. Dispensers selling five gallons

or less at one time will come under the retail end, and must pay a \$20 annual license to the Portland revenue office. Druggists paying a special

as retail liquor dealers at the rate of \$25 per year may sell fermented liquor without payment of a further tax as retail dealer. If

druggists sell five gallons or more at a time, they will be liable for the \$50 wholesale tax.

Taxes will be due July 1, for the year ending June 30, 1934. Failure to pay brings a 25 per cent addition to the tax, and other

Retail dispensers starting self-ing beer in April will be taxed \$5 for the period until July 1; those starting retail sale in May, will pay a \$3.34 tax; and in June, \$1.67 tax. Wholesale tax for the three months prior to July 1. will be \$12.50 if sale is started in April; \$8.34, if in May; and \$4.17 if in June.
