## GHOST WON'T WALK AT CAPITOL TODAY

Revised Payroll not Worked Out yet; Reductions to Be Taken by Many

The payroll ghost will not walk today at the statehouse as is customary on the first of each month, due to delay in determining the exact compensation of all statehouse and affiliated employees.

Failure of some state department heads to send their revised payrolls to the secretary of the board of control and inability of the board to determine on a policy which is deemed to meet the requirements set by the last legislature, has caused the delay.

The paychecks, when issued, will reflect reductions in state employees' pay ranging from 6 to 30 per cent. The law was drafted by the joint ways and means committee of the two legislative branches and was approved with only a few dissenting votes.

The law provides that before the payroll checks may be issued the department heads shall send a list of the names of their employees, the amount of wages they received under the old salary schedule and the adjusted compensation under the legislative act, to the secretary of the state board of control.

The secretary shall then certify the payrolls to the board of control for final approval. In all cases the payrolls shall conform to the salary and wage reductions provided in the law.

## POSTAL EMPLOYEES ON NEW PAY BASIS

Beginning today Salem postal employees will take a 15 per cent reduction in salaries, which at the same time will become effective throughout the nation, Arthur Gifford, assistant postmaster said yesterday. The new order will be in effect until July 1 of this year at which time it will be subject to change.

The new wage slash, coming as a direct result of President Roosevelt's economy bill, will take the place of the entire plan which started last July 1. According to the old plan each employee was required to take one month's leave during the year without pay which amounted to an 8 1/2 per cent reduction, excepting only those who could not possibly be spared from duty for that length of time. The new wage scale will therefore mean a 6 1/2 per cent reduction over the old.

Postmaster John Farrar has been occupied for the last four days in straightening out the muddle into which the office books have been thrown by the change in salary scale. Many employees have not yet taken their furlough for the year and at the same time have paid back part or all of their one month's wages demanded. Some few therefore will receive a refund on the basis of an 18-day layoff which would be the length of furlough required for the nine months from last July 1 until today. On the other hand some men have taken no leave as yet, and these will be required to do so before the end of the fiscal year, July 1.

## 527 MEN WORKING ON COUNTY RELIEF

Five hundred and twenty-seven men have received work this week under the relief program now in effect in this county. The reduction is only 13 men from the 540 mark reached last week, although there has been an almost complete turnover in the personnel this week, due to the work rotation plan adopted by the relief committee.

Improvement of county roads in 20 districts in the county is under way with 20 former road patrolmen in charge of the work. The county court here has provided tools for the men and arranged transportation to and from the community where they reside to the work area. Roads are being widened, smoothed up, and ditches along the roads are being deepened and cleared while brush is being removed from the roads' edges.

Next week another shift of men get to work. Single men are allowed one week's work in full, married men two weeks' work a month while heads of families where there are six or more dependents are allowed as much as three weeks' work a month. Pay for the relief workers is at the rate of \$1.50 for an eight-hour day, 50 cents being paid in cash and \$1 in due bills good for groceries and home supplies from any store in the county.

## Museum at State College is Now Open Every Day

"Visitors to the State college museum have much to say concerning the Wiggins-Lisle collection of Salem guns and weapons on display in the veterans' room, Memorial Union building," according to Dr. J. B. Horner, chairman of the museum committee.

Donegan Wiggins was one of the first to display arms in the museum; and now his collection with that of the late Charles J. Lisle is one of the rarest in the northwest. The old armory building has been rearranged so as to house about 3000 specimens, archaeological, historical and otherwise.

To date the museum has been open to visitors on special occasions only, but arrangements have been made to open it regularly for the time being from 2 to 4 p. m., every day in the week, beginning April 1.

## JETTY CONTRACT BIDS ARE OPENED

S. F. Firm low; Program at Columbia Mouth Will Give Many Jobs

PORTLAND, Ore., March 31—(AP)—With a bid of \$1,686,403.50, Guy F. Atkinson of San Francisco was low of four bidders for reconstruction of about 9,500 feet of the south jetty at the mouth of the Columbia river when proposals were opened today before Major O. O. Kuens, corps of engineers, in charge of the Portland district. The bid was approximately \$400,000 under the government's estimate.

After being reviewed here, bids will be sent to the division engineer at San Francisco, and from

there to the chief of engineers at Washington for final approval or rejection. It was anticipated here that the San Francisco firm will be awarded the contract. The largest item of the project will be the placing of 1,250,000 tons of rock on the jetty from the knuckle outward, raising the structure from a low water to a high water jetty. Another major item will be the building of 9,500 feet of double track and necessary supporting structure with cross-overs and switches at needed points.

Work is to start within 30 days of the contract award and completed within 760 calendar days. Time out will be allowed from November 1 to February 28, a provision made to allow for storms and high seas.

Large crews will be hired for the work, resulting in the payment of a considerable amount of the money in wages to the men on the project and in the quarries. The Columbia contract company completed restoration of the shore end of the jetty in December, ahead of contract time.

## LANE FARMERS TO BACK SALES LEVY

Farmers of Lane county are 75 per cent behind the proposed sales tax, a delegation from Eugene told Governor Julius L. Meier yesterday. Heading the visitors here was E. G. Harlan, secretary of the Eugene chamber.

Harlan declared that while Lane county has more granges than any other county in Oregon, sentiment for the sales tax was increasing and it would receive a satisfactory vote in the rural districts. He said a large number of Eugene business men also would support the sales tax program. Other members of the delegation included Frank Chambers, prominent Eugene banker; A. R. Paris and Clarence Wrey.

After conferring with Governor Meier the visitors held a conference with other state officials in

connection with the flax industry. Harlan said the farmers of Lane county had become interested in this industry, and considerable acreage would be devoted to flax growing during the next few years.

## Mrs. Wisecarver Is Up for Postal Job, McMinnville

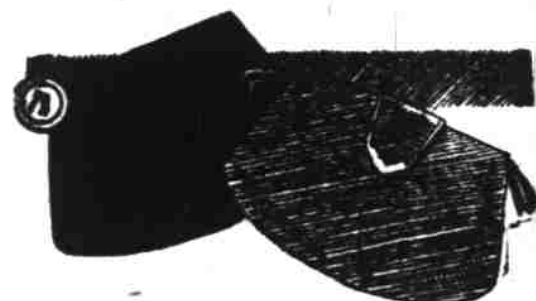
