A careful investigation will later determine all the facts that are available. Sentiments that prompted the navy's investigation were echoed on Capitol Hill, and Chairman Vinson declared the house naval committee would cooperate with the navy's inquiry.

Senator King (D., Utah), planned a resolution for senate investigation, including the advisability of further lighter-than air expenditures. In the house, Representative Fish (R., N. Y.), urged a special inquiry into a report by two justice department agents on charges of sabotage in the construction of the Akron.

Fish introduced a resolution calling for the creation of a special house committee of five to investigate the causes of the Akron disaster.

Wife of Admiral Won't Give up Hope While capital was busy scanning lists of the Akron's missing, hoping against hope that more than the three saved by the Phoenix would be found alive, Secretary Swanson said:

"It is still too early to venture to outline the department's future policy in reference to airships."

At the White House, President Roosevelt kept in close contact with details of the Akron's fate from the first moment he received the news.

He grieved with the nation and especially with the wives and families of the men who were lost."

Mr. Roosevelt said, "Ships can be replaced but the nation can ill afford to lose such men as Rear Admiral William A. Moffett and his shipmates who died with him upholding to the end the finest traditions of the United States navy."

Sotero Martinez, rancher and politician, was wounded. Ansel Mo Trujillo, constable, and Martinez engaged in a fight concerning the casting of a few ballots after the closing of the polls. Reynolds stepped in as peacemaker and was shot dead. Martinez is critically injured. Six shots were fired during the fight.

ROSEBURG, April 4.—(AP)—Milk and beer license fees were placed on a parity last night in ordinances adopted by the city council, the fee for beer dispensing privileges being placed at \$30 per year, while the average milk distributor will pay the same license, under the provisions of the city's new milk ordinance.

and heavy rains, I saw aircraft lights flashing as my ship ploughed its way toward Tampico from New York.

"Shortly afterward I saw lights flashing on the water.

"I changed my course to approach the lights and soon heard men hailing from the water.

"I stopped the ship, turned on all lights, lowered boats, and put lifeboats over the side.

"I saw mattresses and wreckage, and pulled one man over the side of the boat. We got three men. I saw some men sink before we could get them.

"After this no more men were found."

Navy planes, amphibians, commercial planes, coast guard cutters, navy craft and sea-going vessels joined in a search of the scene of the crash for signs of bodies and trace of the silver Akron.

J. D. McCord of Portland is a brother of Commander Frank C. McCord, who lost his life when the Akron went down at sea. He was in Salem yesterday morning calling on Day & Niles, as he is a representative of the United States Rubber company and called The Statesman office to learn more particulars in hopes that his brother might have been one of the survivors. He left here to go east last night by airplane.

Commander McCord was commanding officer of the Akron. He was 42 years old and had been in the navy since he was 16. He leaves a widow.

NINA WINN PARRISH DIES; NATIVE HERE

Granddaughter of Mission Associate of Lee Will Be Buried Thursday

Miss Nina Winn Parrish died at her home here, 455 North Summer street, yesterday. She was born in Salem April 5, 1870 and had spent her entire life here.

She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Hallie Parrish Hinges of Salem and Mrs. E. M. Cox of Seattle.

At the time of her death Miss Parrish was and for many years had been the proprietress of a high class boarding house.

Funeral services will be held from the chapel of the Clough-Barrick company mortuary, Thursday, April 6 at 2 p. m. with Rev. W. C. Kantner and Rev. F. A. Well officiating. Interment will follow in the family plot at the Lee Mission cemetery.

Miss Parrish was only a few days ago, while apparently in her usual health, the victim of a paralytic stroke, from which she did not rally. Some of her friends who had been her patrons went yesterday to a florist's to secure flowers for presentation on her 63d birthday, and were surprised to be told their intended recipient had passed to her long home—missing by only a day the anniversary.

Her father was Norman Parrish, a resident of the capital city from his early youth, who passed on a number of years ago. He was the son, and thus the deceased a granddaughter, of Rev. J. L. Parrish, who came as a member of the famous Lausanne party of missionaries arriving in 1840, with his wife and three children. He held several mission stations, having supervision of work among the Indians, to whom he was known as "the man of peace." He was successful in his mission and other work, held the northeast mile square dona-

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tion claim of the four that make up the site of Salem. He and his wife gave the land on which was built the Glen Oak orphan's home, now one of the buildings of the state hospital; and Lee Mission cemetery is on a part of that claim. The Parrish junior high school was named for him—standing on part of the original Parrish claim. Rev. J. L. Parrish was at the primary meetings leading to the provisional government, upon which the state of Oregon was founded. His name is on the Champeau Park monument. In all pioneering movements, from 1840 on, he was a prominent figure.

wanted to "have them all available."

"The ship took a sharp lurch and the rudder control wires of the upper rudder were carried away. I unclutched the upper rudder and tried to steer with the lower rudder."

"The elevator man reported the ship was falling rapidly."

"In the fog nothing outside could be seen."

"I asked for altitude and the answer was 300 feet. I ordered all hands to stand by for a crash."

"And almost immediately we hit the water."

"Water rushed in the windows on my side, carried me out of the windows on the other side."

"I tried to swim away..." and finally came to the surface.

"I saw the ship drifting away as the lightning flashed."

"The whole structure was a general wreck."

"I saw several men in the water but none very close."

"I made it easily to the ship (the German tank Phoebe) and they threw me a life ring and hauled me aboard. They had boats out and picked up the other three men."
