FAIR PLANS TO BE DISCUSSED TODAY

Gehlhar Calls Meeting for Persons Interested; 1932 Profits aid

Tentative plans for operating the Oregon state fair this fall without the \$37,500 appropriation for premiums heretofore allotted each year by the legislature have been completed. Max Gehlhar, director of agriculture, announced here Wednesday. Gehlhar meets today with the board of agriculture to decide whether or not the fair will be held and to outline his proposed plans. Exhibitors and citizens interested in the fair have been invited to the meeting today.

Gehlhar said yesterday that many persons have already volunteered their services without cost in order that the entire state receipts may be devoted to fair premiums.

Whether exhibits will be open to Oregon exhibitors or whether these classes in which the premium money has been going largely out of the state will be included, remains to be determined by the board. Last year, 50 per cent of the cattle division awards went to out-of-state exhibitors.

"The cash carry-over from the profits of the 1932 fair," said Gehlhar yesterday, "makes the financing of the fair on a self-sustaining basis this year really less of a problem than in 1932 when the fair started out with a deficit."

Members selected to form the nucleus of the organization are Louisa Sidwell, Portland; Harriett Adams, Salem; Elizabeth Bishop, New York city; Mildred Miller, Salem, and Brenda Savage, Salem.
