might be available. One resort between Woodburn and Hubbard was expected to take delivery on Portland beer as quickly as it could be brought in by truck.

Deeded Sale Sight
No beer can be sold in dance halls in Marion county or within 300 feet thereof, the county court ruled late Thursday in a formal order filed here.

The court took the action under authority given it by state law to regulate the conduct of dance halls in the county. Members of the court felt it would be unwise to allow beer to be sold where so many young people want for entertainment.

District Attorney Trindle was ordered to notify all license holders in the county of the court's action.

The order does not affect roadhouses where beer will be sold.

SILVERTON, April 6.—(Special.)—While numerous Silverton residents thirsty for legal beer planned to stay awake and greet "beer day" in what they deemed fitting manner, and licensed retailers announced they were confident of having sufficient supply to meet the demand here Friday, the city council held a special meeting here tonight to consider additional license applications.

Licenses, all of the \$10 variety which permit serving of the "non-intoxicating" brew, were granted to Harold Craig of Mt. Angel, who is reopening the Cozy restaurant; to George Manolis, who plans to serve beer at tables in his establishment, and to Berger Feneide, proprietor of the Duck 'n Swallow.

What, No Beer? is Genuine Worry at Silverton Today

SILVERTON, April 6.—Silverton's big worry at the present time is that, while beer may be sold at Silverton Friday, none may reach here to be sold. Late Thursday no beer had arrived at Silverton and things were looking down for those who had hoped to have their first drink Friday. Whether or not a consignment will arrive Friday morning no one could say. Freighters are also missing at Silverton.

H. Long, feed store proprietor, took out a license to sell in the original package, this license costing only \$5.

DALLAS, April 6.—Four licenses to sell beer in Dallas were issued Wednesday night when the city council met to consider applications filed with the auditor and police judge. Eight applications were placed before the council but four of these were refused for various reasons.

Retail establishments licensed were Dallas Creamery, operated by E. A. Wagner; C. L. Crider, grocery store, and F. A. Nason, confectionery. These places may sell beer either by the bottle or case but it can not be consumed on the premises.

The only business licensed to dispense beer was Koresy's Coffee shop, operated by F. E. Kersey. Beer may be served at Kersey's either with or without meals but may not be sold at the counter. Those desiring it must sit either in booths or at tables.

JACKSON SHERIFF'S SUSPENSION URGED

Political tie-up Prevents
Vigorous Enforcement of
Law, is Finding

Suspension of Sheriff Gordon L. Schermerhorn of Jackson county for a period of not to exceed 90 days or until such time as the peace officers are able to cope properly with the situation there, was recommended in findings filed by Judge W. M. Duncan of Klamath county in the executive department Wednesday.

The investigation of Schermerhorn's fitness to hold office pending disposal of the ballot theft in Jackson county was ordered by Governor Meier at the request of a "committee of one hundred," a Meador organization. The committee charged that Schermerhorn was implicated in the destruction of the ballots and "otherwise had obstructed enforcement of the criminal laws." Mention also was made in the inquest of the slaying of George W. Hartman, constable of the Medford district, by L. A. Banks, ex-newsman publisher and head of the so-called "Good government congress."

What action Governor Meier will take in connection with the condemnation will depend upon the outcome of a conference with Attorney General Van Winkle later this week. Officials said Schermerhorn would draw his salary during the tenure of the suspension.

The findings read, in part: That Gordon L. Schermerhorn was politically aligned with that political faction in Jackson county, on whom had been cast a strong suspicion as the agency which destroyed the ballots cast in the last election in Jackson county.

That because of the influence exerted upon him by this political faction the said Gordon L. Schermerhorn has not in a sufficiently vigorous and efficient manner enforced the criminal laws of the state, and more especially the destruction of the ballots with such firmness and celerity as required in such an emergency as the present.

shop, factory, or manufacturing establishment situated in the United States, in which any person was employed to work more than five days in any week or more than six hours in any day.

The secretary of labor would be given discretionary power to exempt any industries where "special conditions" made it impossible to adopt the drastically reduced work week.

It would not affect farms or railroads.

Articles specifically exempted include newspapers and periodicals, perishable commodities such as fish, sea foods, fruits and vegetables; milk and milk products; and all farm products "processed for first sale by the original producer."

once is made to toll highways. A telegram was sent to Senator McNary Thursday night asking that he urge the required amendment to the Reconstruction Finance corporation act. The telegram was signed by Governor Meier and members of the organization committee.

Actual construction operations would be under the direction of the state highway commission and both highways would be classified as self-liquidating projects. Funds received from toll would be applied on the loan from the government agency.

The proposed Wolf Creek highway is approximately 43 miles in length and the cost was estimated at \$4,500,000. The Wilson river road is 52 miles in length, with a cost estimated at \$4,000,000. Both are on the state highway map.

In addition to these roads the corporation also could expend approximately \$3,000,000 in the construction of new bridges on the Oregon coast highway.

**INSANITY PLEA BY
MOORE INDICATED**
PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—(AP)—Intimation that an insanity plea will figure in the defense of William J. Moore, 34, charged with first degree murder in connection with the death of Harold F. O'Connor, Brooklyn, N. Y. tourist, when the case is called for trial at Hood River next week was made today by Tom Garland, defense attorney.

Garland today served the prosecution with a motion asking the court to direct that a deposition be taken from a Chicago resident to show that Moore is mentally unbalanced and unable to distinguish between right and wrong.

O'Connor was shot to death on the Columbia river highway just west of Hood River. Moore, a hitch hiker, whom O'Connor had given a ride, is charged with the shooting. His trial is scheduled to start Monday at Hood River. Multnomah county will assist in the prosecution.

**Fort Lewis Will
Be Mobilization
Point for N.W.**
TACOMA, Wash., April 6.—(AP)—Fort Lewis will be the assembly and training point for the army of civilian conservation workers now being mobilized by President Roosevelt, unofficial reports said here today.

Preparations have been made at the fort to receive and care for a force of men estimated to number between 3,500 and 4,000. Barracks are being set aside and arrangements made to feed and clothe the men, as well as give them the intensive two weeks training which will precede their actual employment in forest areas.

PHOENIX, Ariz., April 6.—(AP)—Charges of jury tampering were filed tonight by counsel for Winnie Ruth Judd, in another, and perhaps final, legal move to save her from death on the gallows April 31 for murder of Agnes Anne LeRoi.

Earlier in the day the Arizona board of pardons and paroles had denied her application for a reprieve, which she had asked in order to gain time to reorganize her forces in a last desperate battle for life.

PAIR BOUND OVER ON CHECK CHARGE

Officers Expected Here to
Seek Woman's Return to
California Justice

Mrs. Doris Lewis and Paul Lewis, apprehended here late Saturday on forgery charges, and since learned to be sought by several California cities on similar charges, were bound over to the grand jury Wednesday noon, following preliminary hearing before Judge Miller Hayden.

Neither defendant took the stand and efforts of defense attorney, Ed Keesh, to have the charge against Lewis dismissed on ground that there was no evidence he had part in the alleged crime were fruitless. Keesh also attempted to have grand jury probe waived and the pair go direct before the circuit judge, but this was denied.

Both Lewis and Mrs. Lewis, who are known in coast cities by a series of aliases, were never about the justice court appearance.

Police say she has employed nearly 80 different names in her activities, with 21 arrests listed for her in California. She escaped from a San Francisco hospital prior to her arrest.

Ball for the pair was continued at \$1,000, and they are still in the county jail here.

"The old-timers want work but many of the youngsters don't care if they ever work or not," R. N. "Tiny" Yonkers, cook at Hotel de Minto, declared yesterday when asked about the stream of unemployed men and boys which pours through the police "refugees" daily. With the spring weather instilling the call of the road in more men, the "hotel" is as busy as during the winter and provides an average of over 100 meals daily.

The trend of travel is not in any one direction; men come from the south as others head toward the south. Latest talk among the transients is "government camp work" and Chicago world's fair, according to Yonkers. Most of the men visiting the flophouse say they hope to strike out for Chicago this summer.

How much longer the "hotel" will be kept open is as yet undecided, according to Chief of Police Frank Minto. He is considering closing the place up sometime this spring. It was kept in operation all last summer.
