At the same time the thirsty flocked to the one source of beer in the city yesterday, hundreds of motorists struck out north and south along the highway seeking a roadside stand stocked with the beverage. The result was that supplies of beer lasted but a few hours at most. When more beer would be available was unknown. It was generally expected little beer would be on sale again until next Monday and later when shipments will begin coming from San Francisco and eastern breweries.

Graham Sharkey "scooped" all others when he arrived in Salem at 2 p. m. yesterday morning. His light truck bearing four 16-gallon kegs of beer destined for Salem Golf club. Yesterday afternoon the first keg was tapped there and its contents dealt to dozens of club members.

DALLAS, April 7 — Kersey's restaurant has disposed two barrels of 3.2 beer here in two hours today. Other business houses were expecting bottled beer shipments Monday or later.

The latest to obtain a city beer license is the Blue Garden confectionery, operated by Paul Skeels.

MONMOUTH, April 7 — C. E. Fetzer, proprietor of the Violet Ray cafe here, made application this week for a license to sell beer in Monmouth. As the city council ruled that while the beer may be non-intoxicating, it is alcoholic, therefore contravening the city charter and ordinance No. 1. Fetzer got no license.

MT. ANGEL, April 7 — Beer was legally saleable by licensed dealers here today through action of the city council. The licensing system will be in effect, at least, until June 5, when the voters will decide on a proposed charter amendment to empower the city to engage in the buying and selling of non-intoxicating beverages and of intoxicating beverages in so far as the law may allow.

# EDUCATION CONFAB SLATED, MONMOUTH

Dr. A. L. Suhrie of New York Will be Guest Speaker; Others too

MONMOUTH, April 7.—Preparations are being made for the seventh annual educational conference at the Oregon Normal school, to be held here Saturday and Sunday, April 22. Dr. Arne S. Jensen is again acting chairman of the conference committee.

The leading speaker will be Dr. Ambrose L. Suhrie, professor of the department of education in New York university. Other educators participating in the conference will be Dr. John R. Mueller, university of Oregon; Dean H. G. Sheldon, University of Oregon; Miss A. Frances Lawrence, of eastern Oregon normal school; C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction; Superintendent C. A. Rice of Portland and others.

A library display of books attractively arranged will be a special feature. Exhibits in the primary department of the training school and in the art department of the normal are planned.

An added feature of interest will be the attendance of representatives from the placement bureau of the University of Oregon and Oregon State college who will be here to aid high school teachers in finding positions. Opportunity also is offered to graduating students to interview superintendents concerning positions for next year.

# CHARITIES PROVIDE FOR 314 FAMILIES

The need of indigent residents of Marion county still is very great. Mrs. J. H. Ross, executive secretary of Salem Associated Charities, informed the directors at their monthly meeting Thursday. She listed work of the charities in March as follows:

Three hundred fourteen families, consisting of 760 individuals, cared for: 134 grocery orders valued at \$99.19 given, 43 wood orders at \$97.50, four allotments of bedding and furniture at \$7, 154 articles of clothing, including layettes, at \$99.54, and 1350 meals at \$125. Total value of donations to the needy was \$438.32.

The board expressed appreciation for the excellent support of the public, especially in the matter of cash contributions.

# New Sheriff of Jackson County To Take Office

MEDFORD, Ore., April 7.—(AP)—Walter J. Oimscheid, appointed by Governor Julius L. Meier yesterday to act as Jackson county sheriff during the 90 days' suspension of Sheriff Gordon L. Schermerhorn, will take the oath of office Monday, it was announced today.

Official notice of his appointment was received here today. Schermerhorn is under indictment for complicity in the theft of 19,000 ballots from the county courthouse on the eve of a recount to determine the legality of his election.

# Better Highway Maintenance in 1933 Predicted

PORTLAND, April 7.—(AP)—Dr. E. B. McDonald, president of the Oregon State Motor association, said here today that Oregon motorists may expect from 15 to 20 per cent better maintenance on their highways in 1933 than in 1932.

# MISSION REPORTS EXTENSIVE RELIEF

Monthly report of the Open Door Mission, 315 1/2 North Commercial, shows the largest activities since the mission was opened for relief of needy here. This increased work has been made possible by the full cooperation of various churches in the city, states Pastor Earl J. Sechrist.

The relief department of the mission last month gave to the needy: 33 pairs of shoes, 24 child's garments, 75 adult garments, at relief prices valued at \$50; lodged 930 transients; took care of 26 sick persons; checked 1500 articles without charge; gave to transients only 250 haircuts; and served 4,119 meals to transients and others.

Allowing \$50 for the clothing distributed, a cent each for transients lodged and articles checked, 10 cents each for meals and haircuts and a dollar each for sick patients, the total cash value of this work all done without charge, was \$548.

Mr. Sechrist states liberal donations to the mission have made this showing possible.

A number of Salem pastors are occupying the pulpit each night, thus aiding the temporal and spiritual needs.

# STATE REPAYS ROAD BOARD \$519,981.40

The state treasurer yesterday repaid to the state highway commission \$519,981.40 covering the balance of \$700,000 originally borrowed for use of the general fund. Of the amount repaid \$518,455.40 represents principal and \$1526 interest. A payment of \$181,544.60 previously was made on the loan.

Repayment of the full \$700,000 transferred from the highway fund to the general fund and \$730,000 of the \$1,000,000 repaid to the World War Veterans State Aid sinking fund leaves outstanding only \$270,000, which was transferred to the bus commission account and \$1,024,000 with six months' interest thereon, to the Portland banks. The latter loan draws five per cent interest.

Treasury department officials estimated that by May 1 approximately \$200,000 of the bus loan and interest would be repaid. This would live \$350,000 owing to the Portland banks, with approximately \$1,900,000 of first-half property taxes payable June 1. The bus loan probably will be paid early in June.

Francisovich of Astoria, and Deans Lawrence and Rogers of the college. Dean Schoenfeldt will be the presiding officer and Frank Branch Riley the speaker at the banquet.
