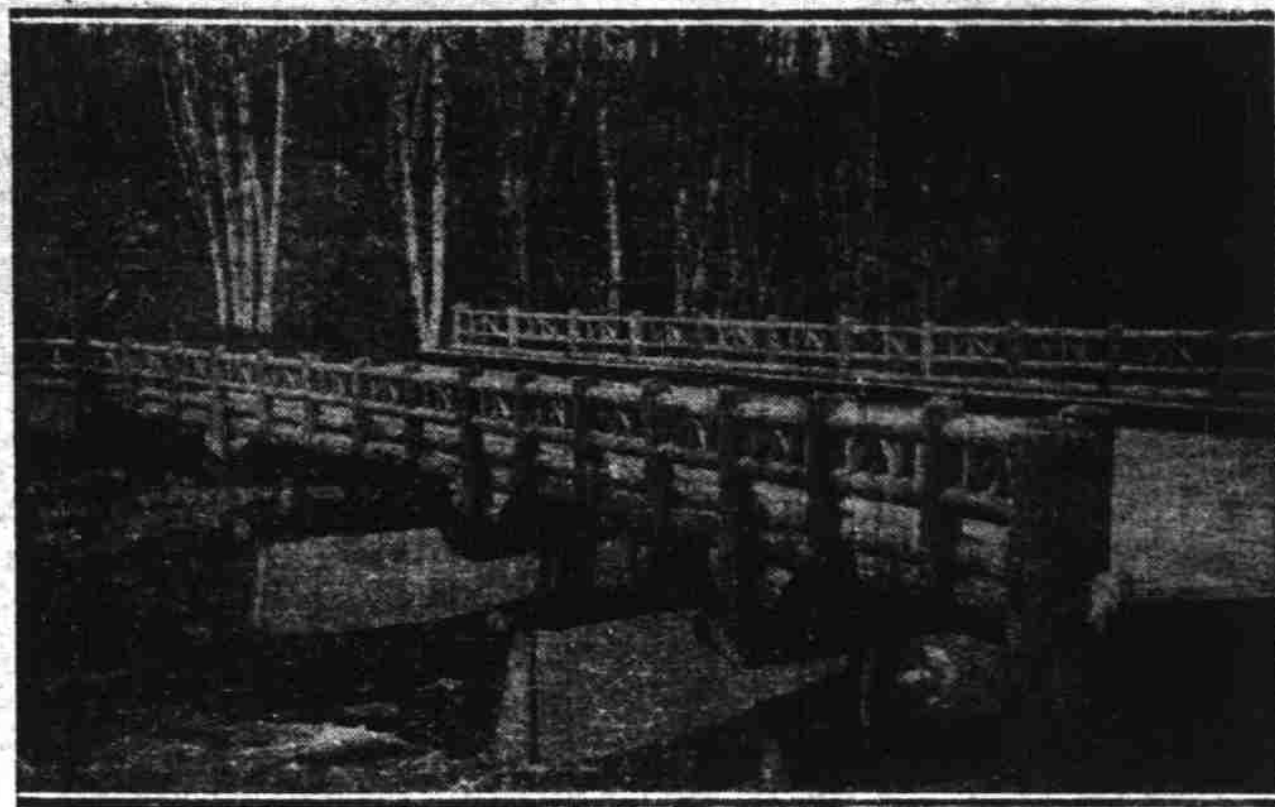

BEAUTIFUL NEW BRIDGE TO OPEN



Within a few weeks the approaches to this lovely new bridge will have been completed and the new structure in the Silver Falls state park area will be ready for use. The bridge is over the North Silver creek, 14 miles from Silvertown. It is thought to be the only one of its type on any Oregon highway. It is made entirely of native material. The railing is of rustic logs. The decking is of 2x3 cedar laid lengthwise on a solid floor of 4x12s. It is 102 feet center length, 5-foot walk on either side and a 24-foot driveway. The structure is built on a 26-degree curve with a 2-foot super, all built in to fit with the road at this particular point, which describes a complete semi-circle. The bridge itself is set on five concrete piers. Hedda Swart, Marion county engineer, designed the bridge and supervised its construction. A. G. Enright of Eugene was the contractor. The bridge is practically the last connecting link of the loop of the picturesque highway known as the Silver Creek Falls state secondary highway, which forms a loop from Salem out through Silvertown to the Silver Falls state park and back over the Waldo hills into Salem.
