BUTTER SHORTAGE BECOMES SERIOUS

Produce Exchange Calls for Special Meeting; Prices Up 1/2-1c Pound

PORTLAND, April 12.—(AP)—There was a general advance in the price on butter in Portland today. The shortage of supplies became so serious that a special meeting of the produce exchange was called. All prices were up for the session, extras advancing 1c and others 1/2c lb.

For some time past it has been apparent that shipping interests were bearing down local prices too far in their efforts to make it appear as if they were getting more money by moving the supplies to California points. The local trade has been drained of its needed supplies and prices here have been firmer than anywhere else along the coast.

The advance of 1c pound in the buying price on butterfat suggested the strength in the trade here. However, buying prices were not uniform. The Portland price ranges from 16 to 18c pound with the bulk purchased at 17c. This was for churning cream, sweet cream being higher as usual.

Markets for eggs continued to reflect a very erratic trade tone even though there were no open market changes here for the day. Trade in the live chicken market continued its strong tone along the wholesale way. There were, however, no changes in price for the day. All sorts were in demand.

Spring lambs were weaker and lower for country killed offerings. Sales were around 16c for tops and 10 to 15c for poor to ordinary, all with pelts off.

Markets were well held in the market for country hogs. There were no changes in either line for the day. Beef also continued in good call.

Old crop Oregon and Yakima onions were moving very slowly and little trading was suggested at the source. The fact there has been little demand for Oregon since the price boost and new Texan were arriving.

McCorkle Planting Two Acres Berries In Hayesville Area

HAYESVILLE, April 12.—Archibald McCorkle is taking advantage of the clear weather and is planting about two acres of strawberries. Farmers in this district are working to get their spring seeding done as soon as possible.
