Chorus Will Stress American Music

As the date draws near for the presentation of the spring concert by the Salem MacDowell club, April 20, interest is stirred in the kind of program to be presented by the chorus in addition to the solo piano work of the guest artist, David Campbell.

American music will be featured in this program more than in those of the past according to Miss Lena Belle Tartar. An interesting group of Shakespearian songs the music of which comes from the pens of American composers will be one of the high lights of the program.

A three part song, "Come Away Death," and two others, "Under the Greenwood Tree" and "Sigh No More Ladies" are also being stressed. The whole program will be light and gay in keeping with the spring and in contrast to days of depression.

Miss Tartar feels that the chorus is much better unified for this production than it has been in the past and that its tonal quality is greatly improved and blended. 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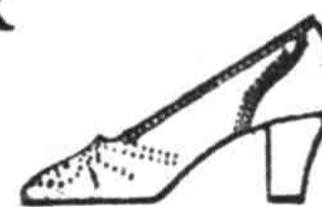
