

Wrestling Fans to Greet Wildcat Pete's Return Tonight

REED AND RYAN IN MAIN EVENT

Newcomer Touted; Eugene's Favorite Son Appears After Long Period

Wildcat Pete, with whom Salem fans have seldom agreed excepting in his conviction that he is a right smart wrestler, will lend his colorful personality to the mat shows here once more, beginning tonight, after an absence of many months; and though he is billed in the one-hour bout this time, against Bob Anderson of Camp Lewis, that does not prevent the Wildcat's return from holding the spotlight in wrestling fan interest.

Pete has held at various times most of the championships appropriate to one of his size, including the world junior middleweight crown; and he is ranked among the first ten as a full middleweight, by recognized sporting guides. That of course does not interest Salem fans quite so much as the fighting spirit he carried into every encounter, an attitude which has earned him the Wildcat cognomen.

Bob Anderson's unusual physique and his willingness to mix are expected to make this a bout which should serve admirably to re-introduce the Wildcat and his wiles.

The main event brings together Robin Reed, the world welterweight king, and Ray Ryan, billed as of Portland but really a newcomer there from the southwest; a man about whom little is known here except that he has been recommended as worthy of a bout with Reed.

Tuffy Davis and Joe Gardiner will clash in a 60-minute preliminary.

The Salem Senators made an improved showing Sunday at Grand Ronde when they battled Grand Ronde Mid-Willamette Valley league team to a 2-all deadlock for 10 innings and then crashed through for four runs to win, 6 to 2, in the eleventh.

Fred Kiminki retired nine of the Grand Ronde boys in consecutive order in the first three innings, but in the fourth allowed three hits, a single, a triple and a double, which combined with an error gave Grand Ronde its two runs.

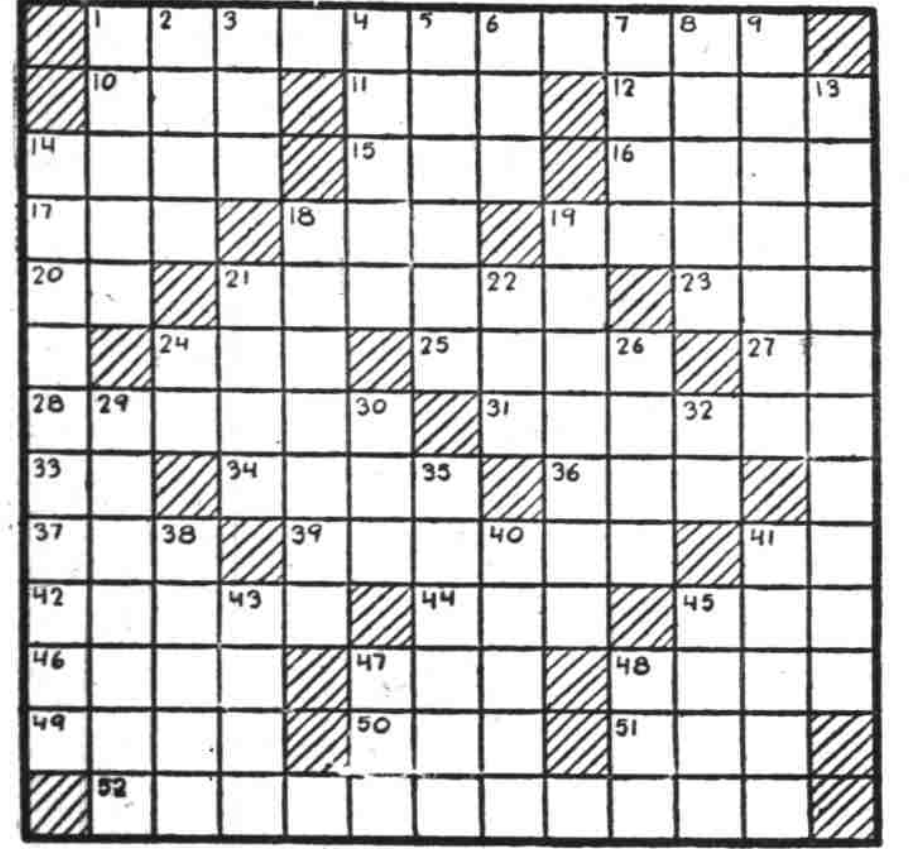
KINGMAN WINNER

Cross-Word Puzzle

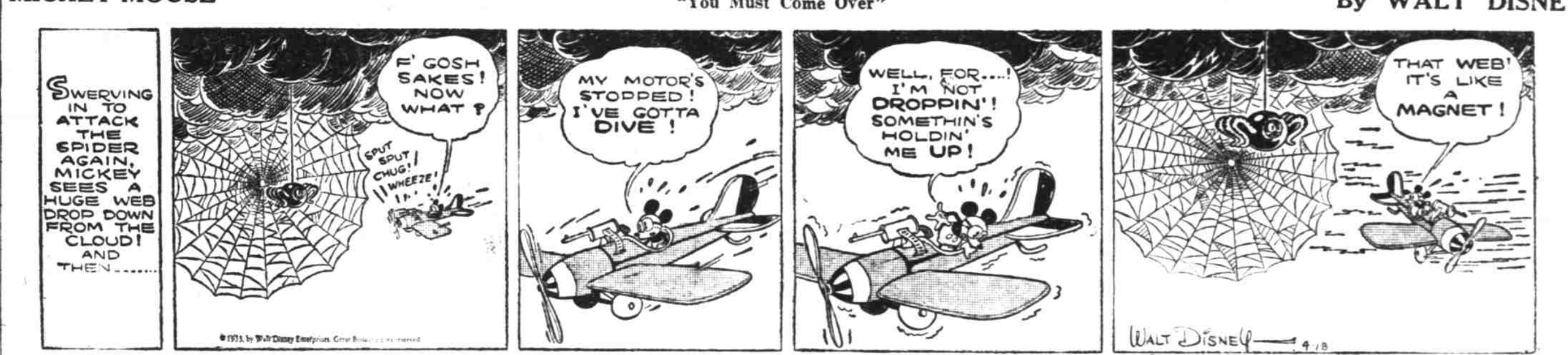
