With approximately two billion dollars of new currency available under the recently enacted banking law, the banks had called for only \$21,652,381 up to April 18. Only five federal reserve districts had used any of this new currency—New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Cleveland and St. Louis.

Directing this available money into the fields of industry and commerce is what Secretary Woodin hopes to find how to do in conference with the governors.

The second big problem, he believes, is the loosening of the four or five billion dollars still tied up in closed banks. He is optimistic of progress in this direction but is making no predictions.

MAX FERRAR TO GO ON TRIAL THURSDAY

Trial of Max Ferrar, charged with assault and battery upon S. Ellis Parvin, Community Service president, is scheduled to start in circuit court here Thursday morning. 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WRIGHT LINFIELD COLLEGE ALUMNUS

Active on Campus; Member
Of Baptist Church and
Knights of Pythias

Bern A. Wright, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Wright of Idaho Falls, Ida., was born at Idaho Falls, September 5, 1901 and died at Salem, April 5, 1933.

After completing high school at his boyhood home, he entered Linfield college at McMinnville from which institution he was graduated in June 1926. He was editor of the school paper for one year, manager of an all-college historical pageant, and president of his junior class, as well as a participant in the activities of the Alpha Gamma Nu fraternity.

Wright entered his chosen occupation as teacher with a position on the faculty of the high school at Enterprise, advancing later to the position of principal, which he held for three years until overtaken by his final illness. In June 1929 Wright married Miss Wilma Pratt of Salem who now survives him, as do also his parents; his brother, Worth D.

Wright of Idaho Falls and two sisters, Mrs. Nellie Detrick of Des Moines and Mrs. Bessie Dayley of Pocatello, Idaho.

From early boyhood he was a consistent member of the Baptist church. He was also a member of the Knights of Pythias lodge.

Two Amendments Are Referred to People July 21

Ballot titles for two proposed constitutional amendments to be referred to the voters of Oregon at the special election July 21, were completed here yesterday by I. H. Van Winkle, attorney general.

One amendment authorizes counties to adopt the managerial form of government, while the other requires a two-thirds affirmative vote on bond issues except those for refunding purposes. Both of these amendments were approved by the 1933 legislature and referred to the voters.
