**Tuberculosis Wanes**—No new cases of tuberculosis were reported in Marion county last week, across four were discovered the previous week, the latest bulleting of the state department of health shows. While measles cases dwindled from 25 to 17, three cases of scarlet fever broke out against none the week before. Other diseases reported were influenza 10, pneumonia four and chickenpox six. The 40 disease cases reported last week were 10 more than the previous week.
