

Bearcat Trackmen Show Strength, win Triangular Meet

JACK CONNORS BEATS RECORD

Tosses Shot 42 ft. 4 1/2 in.; Lloyd and McCullough Show Improvement

Exhibiting even more strength than had been anticipated, the Willamette university track and field team won decisively in a triangular meet on Sweetland field Friday afternoon, scoring 9 1-3 points to 47 1-8 for Oregon Normal and 45 1-2 for the Salem Y. M. C. A. The race for second place was not decided until the relay as the Y. had a chance to nose ahead of the teachers by one-sixth of a point.

Willamette took seven first places, Oregon Normal five and the Y. two. Willamette and the Y. both outscored the Wolves in second, third and fourth places.

The outstanding performance of the day was Jack Connors' toss of 42 feet 4 1/2 inches in the shot put, a heave which exceeded the recognized Northwest conference mark. This performance indicated that Connors will be a contender in the conference meet, but he will have to keep on hustling as these records have been falling at each successive meet.

Are Made in Meet

George Lloyd came close to the conference record in the broad jump and several other good marks were made. Hart of Oregon Normal won the 100, 220 and high hurdles all in good time, heating out Page of the Y. in the two dashes.

McCullough of Willamette made the best time of his career, 2:07, in the 880, and ran one quarter in the relay two seconds faster than the same distance was made in the Northwest conference.

Page of the Y. ran the most thrilling race of the day in the 440, passing the entire field after a poor start.

Willamette's best showing was in the distance events, Cook, Mealey and Felker all placing in the mile and Brown, Lange and Adler finishing one-two-three in the two miles.

This was not at all the fault of whoever happened to be coaching, but rather was to be laid to general lack of interest and facilities.

The season is still young, but Willamette's track team seems on the way to emergence from its perennial cellar position in the Northwest conference. A lot of credit is coming to Vernon Gilmore, in charge of the coaching this year, and to the students in general who have apparently turned over a new leaf and are enthusiastically backing this sport.

The Salem Tennis association is getting ready for action. The first intercity matches will be a week from Sunday with Monmouth, Derrill Myers, president, announces that the rankings will be made out next Friday, and that any of last year's members who have not paid dues by that time, will be left off and will have to challenge from near the bottom when they do sign up. 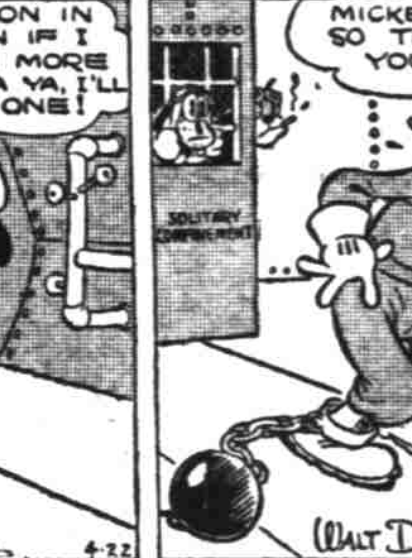

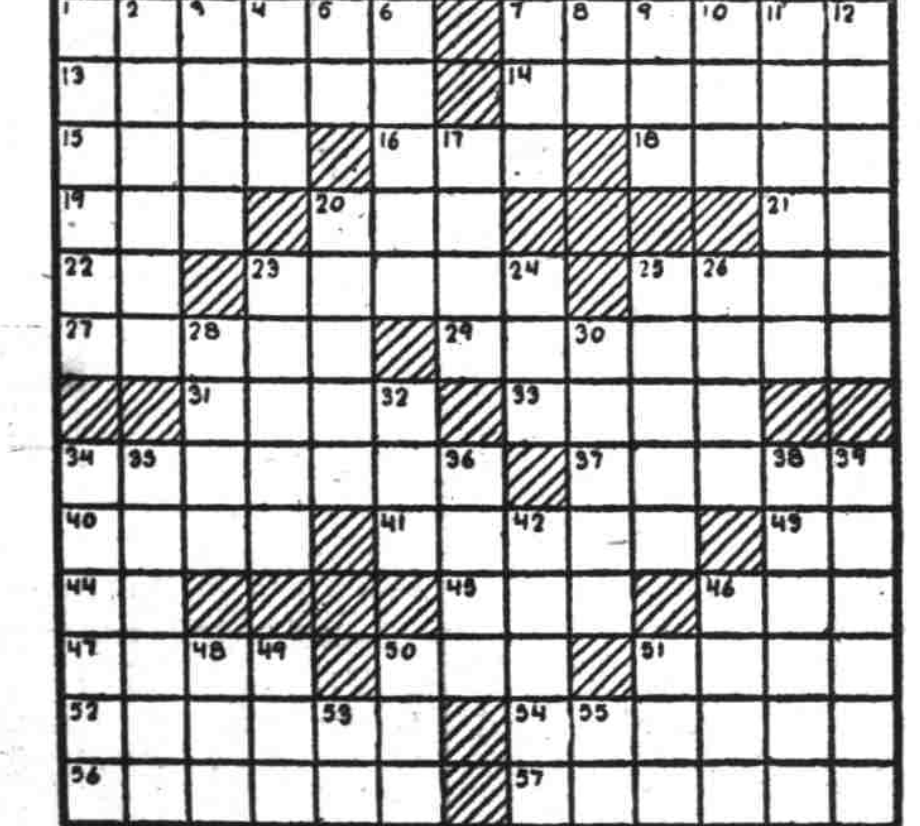
