Gun Stolen Here?—Chief of Police Frank Minto yesterday was wondering if some Salem resident had failed to report theft of a revolver here since March 22. He said, however, he was inclined to doubt the assertion of Bobby Burns, under arrest in Portland in connection with the Walker-McClain gang murder, that the gun he carried when taken to jail was stolen from a Salem home. Burns was released from the state penitentiary here March 22 after serving a long term for forgery.

PUBLIC SWIM TANK IS PROPOSED HERE

Marked interest was evinced by Lions club members yesterday in a proposed club project of sponsoring the construction of a public swimming pool in Salem. A special committee, headed by Edward Acklin, brought to the meeting two experts on the subject, P. H. Huedepohl, swimming promotion manager for the Jackson Knitting mills, and Richard Sundeleaf, architect, both of Portland.

The two men outlined possible pool plans and costs and asserted that funds for a public pool could easily be raised and the plant itself would pay for overhead expense. Sundeleaf estimated that a 50 by 110 foot pool, complete with sterilizing, filtering and heating equipment, showers, suits and locker rooms, would cost between \$17,000 and \$20,000. A pool could be built for from \$3500 up, Huedepohl said. Four years ago a large pool such as would be desirable here would have cost \$40,000, they declared.

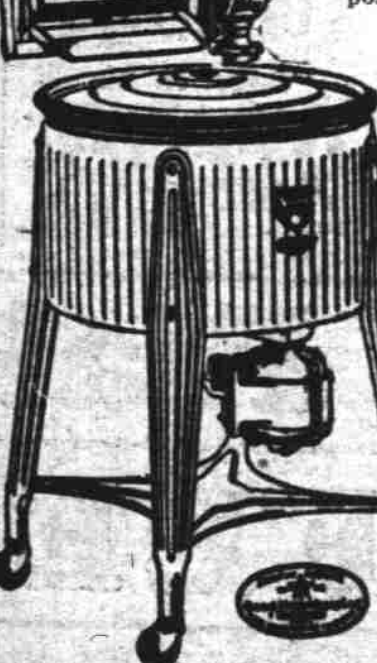
