

NEW PLYMOUTH ON DISPLAY IN SALEM

The aggressive campaign of the Plymouth Motor corporation on the two new lines of motor cars starts here today.

The Plymouth corporation has done the unusual by announcing two new motor cars within a week's period, and both cars, it was asserted, are being backed by an advertising and merchandising campaign.

Announcement of the new Plymouths followed the recent statement of Walter P. Chrysler that he felt that present conditions were opportune for the introduction of new products, and that "the manufacturer... who offers unusual values and aggressively places his products before the people, will be in a position to realize the greatest sales." He further stated that "it is up to us as manufacturers—and it is up to our dealers—to show the public how much good sense there is in buying today. And it's up to buyers to look into what the dollar will buy today."

The new Plymouths are now on

display here at Dodge, DeSoto and Chrysler dealers. The new cars are the Deluxe Plymouth six of 113-inch wheelbase, which is priced at \$498 and the Standard Plymouth six, 108-inch wheelbase, priced at \$445.

The new Standard Plymouth six sedan, priced at \$410, is stated to be the lowest priced six-cylinder four-door sedan on the American motor car market.

The Plymouth factory is working full speed on production of both new models.

Bonds of Aurora Bank to be Sold

Sale of bonds belonging to the Aurora State bank, insolvent, was authorized by the circuit court Thursday. The Associated Gas and Electric bond of \$1000 par value is to be sold for \$140; two Cities Service bonds of \$1000 par value each are to be sold for \$270 each. The court authorized the state banking superintendent to compromise a \$2150 obligation owed by J. J. Hershberger for \$2000 and to relieve him from further obligation as an endorser of a \$500 note. Hershberger's financial statement showed his liabilities exceeded his assets.

Ralph Cook who expects to receive an appointment from the General Missionary Society for work in India as soon as financial conditions permit.

Mrs. Ralph Cook is also N. Y. P. S. secretary for the north Pacific district and will give a report of the young people's work of the district. Rev. and Mrs. Cook will give several musical selections.

Ross to Attend Convention of Baptist Group

Rev. and Mrs. Britton Ross of the First Baptist church here will leave Monday morning for Los Angeles, from where they will go to Washington, D. C., where he will attend as a delegate the Northern Baptist convention.

For the first time in 90 years, the convention this year will see a joint session of the Northern and Southern Baptists. From the combined convention wonderful results are predicted, Rev. Ross says.

The convention will be in session from May 19 to 29. Rev. and Mrs. Ross will return here early in June. During their absence, services at the local church will be in charge of the board of deacons.

Before returning, they also expect to visit the world's fair in Chicago.

The girls' quartet consists of Miss Vera Culp, Miss Hazel Shrock, Miss Daisy Shrock and Miss Helen Woodfin. Miss Vera Jean Huber will be accompanist, and Miss Nelma Saylor, faculty member and instructor for the glee club, will accompany the group to Forest Grove.

McIlwaine Held On Still Charge

Scrip Workers' Status Queried By Frank Grant

Frank Grant, city attorney of Portland, was here Thursday conferring with Attorney General Van Winkle as to whether Multnomah county and the city of Portland are exempt from contributing to the workmen's compensation fund in cases where the employees receive only scrip in payment for labor.

Grant alleged the scrip is not money and as a result the county and city should not be expected to protect men receiving this form of compensation under the provisions of the workmen's compensation law.

Van Winkle indicated that he might prepare an opinion later.
