Title Prepared — Ballot title for the referendum measure attacking the so-called grange power bill approved by the 1933 legislature, was completed by Attorney General VanWinkle Friday. The law provides for the creation of a power commission of three members, abolishing the existing hydro-electric commission, and authorizes the issuance and sale of bonds up to \$65,000,000. Any bond sales under the law must be approved by the voters. The referendum was filed by the Security Owners association, a state-wide organization.

Sheriffs to Meet Here — The next meeting of the district of the Northwest Sheriffs' association is to be held in Salem this summer. Sheriff A. C. Burk and Newell Williams, deputy, reported here yesterday after attending a regional meeting in St. Helena on Thursday night. The case concerned a collision which took place last June at Winter and Belmont streets. The action marked the final case in circuit court for April before Judge L. H. McMahon who dismissed the present jury panel.

Wholesale Prices R's e Generally, Merchants Report

Notices of advances in wholesale prices are being quite generally received by Salem merchants. Cotton goods, silks, shoes and rubberwear have all felt the effects of inflation, merchants report, with the result that wholesalers are quoting higher prices, ranging from 5 to 10 per cent above March quotations. Merchants locally have not yet advanced retail prices but will have to when present stocks are exhausted. Stiffened prices for paper have brought a flood of orders to the Oregon Pulp & Paper company here. Shipments on river boats have been heavy and some additional men have been put on at the local plant.
