

Oregon State Bests Webfeet in Annual Dual Relay Meet

BEAVERS TAKE FIVE OF RACES

Honors now all Even; Fair Time Made in Spite of Cold, Rain, Wind

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 29 — (AP)—Oregon State college defeated the University of Oregon in a dual relay meet held here today. The weather was cold and windy and it rained through most of the meet. Oregon State's victory today evened up the honors since the meet was started in 1928, each school having won three times.

The Orangemen clinched the four-mile relay when Coach Hayward pulled Wentz, third runner, when he was more than half a lap behind Willson.

Colosano, Orange quarter miler, furnished the closest finish in the meet when overcoming a lead given to Bowerman, he broke the tape only a few inches ahead of the Oregon runner in the sprint medley.
