From morning until late at night a million persons of all classes swarmed through Moscow's red square and saluted Joseph V. Stalin, Russia's dictator. A large military display was outstanding in the workers' celebration.
Several were injured in Madrid when police broke up a demonstration of about 1000 communists.
Peru was in a state of seige because of the assassination Sunday of President Sanchez Cerro by an alleged revolutionary. The assassin and two soldiers were killed and eight others were hurt.
Soldiers and police in Cuba were taking precautions to prevent a recurrence of revolts in Oriente province.

Chinese Driven Southward With Extensive Loss

KUPEIKOW, on the Great Wall of China, May 1.—(AP)—A combined infantry and aerial attack by Japanese forces today displaced and drove into retreat an army of 5000 Chinese who remained in a salient north of the great wall, according to a report of the Renzo (Japanese) news agency. This report asserts the Chinese losses were heavy, being estimated at 700 killed, while the Japanese forces lost only 8 killed. The Chinese force was said to be in retreat toward the south.

Einzig to Survey Uses for Federal Moneys in Oregon

William Einzig, secretary of the state board of control, Monday was instructed by Governor Meier to conduct a survey of all state institutions to determine if there are any projects which could be promoted under the federal public works program. It is not necessary that these projects be self-liquidating, the governor said.
Several state projects were suggested at the 1933 legislative session but no action was taken because of the shortage of state funds. These included a new wing at the Eastern Oregon State hospital, state power plant at the penitentiary, and modern sewage system.

Taxpayers were lined up from early morning until late afternoon at the courthouse Monday, seeking statements of their 1933 tax accounts and making first-half or complete payments of taxes which will be due May 5. The heaviest payments of the year have been made the last two days with every expectation at the courthouse that the rush will continue until Friday night. After that date taxes for the first half of 1933 will bear interest at 8 per cent. The big payments from utilities usually come the last two or three days of the tax paying period. NOBODY INJURED IN CHICAGO BOMBINGS

CHICAGO, May 1.—(AP)—Five synchronous blasts of dynamite thickened a terrifying greeting today to an otherwise mild May day in Chicago.
The cry of "communists!" soon died away as police made known a suspicion the bombs spoke for gangs engaged in the old war for control of the trucking business.
The dynamite explosions reverberated through the loop and the gold coast at 2:30 a. m.
They focused upon the Illinois Bell telephone building on Washington boulevard; the Willett Bus and Tearing company; the Stratford building, three floors of which housed Marshall Field and company shops; the Hibbard, Spencer, Bartlett hardware building and Sprague, Warner & company, wholesale grocers.
The tornado struck coast residents and terror-stricken denizens of downtown hotels took the quickest route to the open air. Stone and steel portals of the five buildings were wrecked, thousands of windows were blown into bits, but not a person was injured. Estimates of damage were \$100,000.

F. R. REMINDED OF COLUMBIA PROMISE

Inclusion in the federal public works bill of an amount of money sufficient to build one unit of the Columbia river power development proposed below the mouth of Snake river, was urged by Governor Meier in telegrams sent Monday to President Roosevelt and members of Oregon's delegation in congress.
Governor Meier declared that development of any one of the four projects would mean an expenditure of approximately \$40,000,000, and the generation of 600,000 horsepower.
"May I hope that in the public works bill intended by you for employment relief and to erect structures of lasting public benefit there may be included an amount of money necessary to build one unit of the Columbia river development proposed below the mouth of Snake river and in accordance with your statement in Portland of September 21, 1932, that the Columbia river must be the next large hydro-electric development undertaken by the federal government," Governor Meier's telegram to President Roosevelt read.
