

Jiu-Jitsu Artist to Demonstrate His System Tonight

HIGAMI FACES WILDCAT PETE

Delicate way of Persuading Foe to Wreck Himself to Be Shown Fans Here

Salem wrestling fans may have seen Jiu-Jitsu wrestling, for some of the principles of this highly interesting Japanese "art of self defense" are applied by many wrestlers; but if they have, they haven't realized it, and all of them are anxious to see just what it is all about when Petrus Higami comes here to demonstrate at the armory tonight against Wildcat Pete.

Jiu-jitsu, the accepted spelling of which is really "jijitsu," is based on the principle of making one's opponent throw himself, or injure himself. The jiu-jitsu artist, instead of using force to subvert or other and then, by exerting pressure in a peculiar way, takes advantage of the foe's momentum. It requires, of course, an extensive practical knowledge of anatomy.

Pete will have an opportunity to wrestle according to the rules which have always applied here, for one fall, and Higami will have the advantage in one fall, as jiu-jitsu rules will apply. For the deciding fall, if there is a third one, will be contested according to whatever set of regulations the fans select.
