## BADGERS RULE AS FAVORITES

### Meet Friday is Last Chance For W. U. to win Over Jenne's Athletes

Willamette university's track and field team will engage in one of its major campaigns of the season Friday when it goes to Forest Grove to meet the Pacific university squad. Forced for many seasons past to bow to the Badgers in this sport though the results in other types of competition have been the reverse, the Bearcats are prepared to battle for every point in the hope of upsetting tradition and the "dope" as well—and they want to do it before Eldon Jenne relinquishes the reins at Pacific.

Though this year's Willamette team, coached by Vernon Gilmore is regarded as the strongest in years, it is the under dog as usual in the meet with Pacific. The Badgers, hosts for the Northwest conference meet this year, are favorites to win the conference title. They are especially strong in the sprints, hurdles and jumps, including the pole vault.

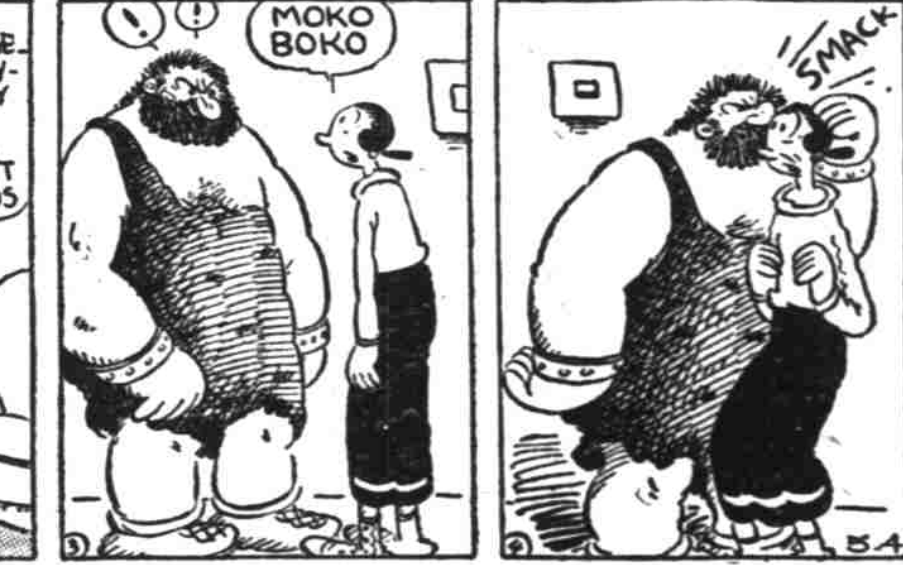
