PATCHWORK QUILT PATTERN

The Rose Basket No. 402

By Laura Wheeler. Baskets of tulips, roses, or other familiar flowers were favorite motifs in old-time quilts. The flowers stood prim and stiff in little triangular baskets that sometimes were made of one triangle, sometimes of a number of triangles, as in this design. The rose makes a quaint but simple applique patch. The basket and the corners of the block are patchwork.

This design is easy to make because the pattern includes complete simple instructions for cutting, sewing and finishing, yardage chart, diagram of full size quilt to help arrange the blocks for single and double bed size, diagram of block which serves as a guide for placing the patches and suggests contrasting materials and clearly outlined drawing of the patch pieces.

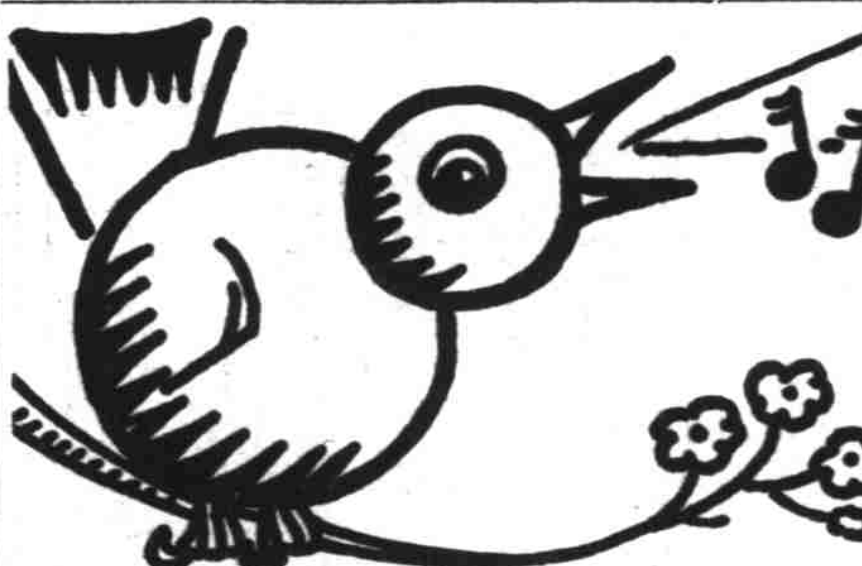
