**Albany College Co-eds Defeat W. U. Net Team**

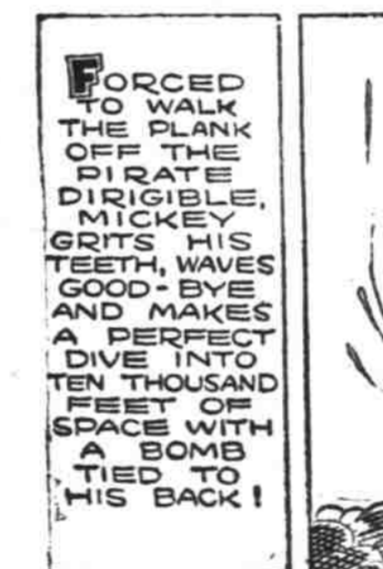

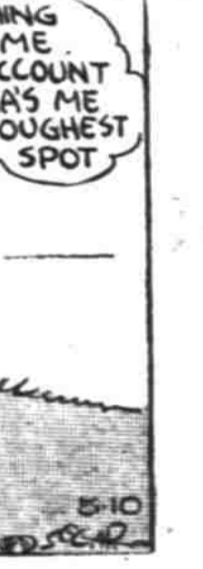
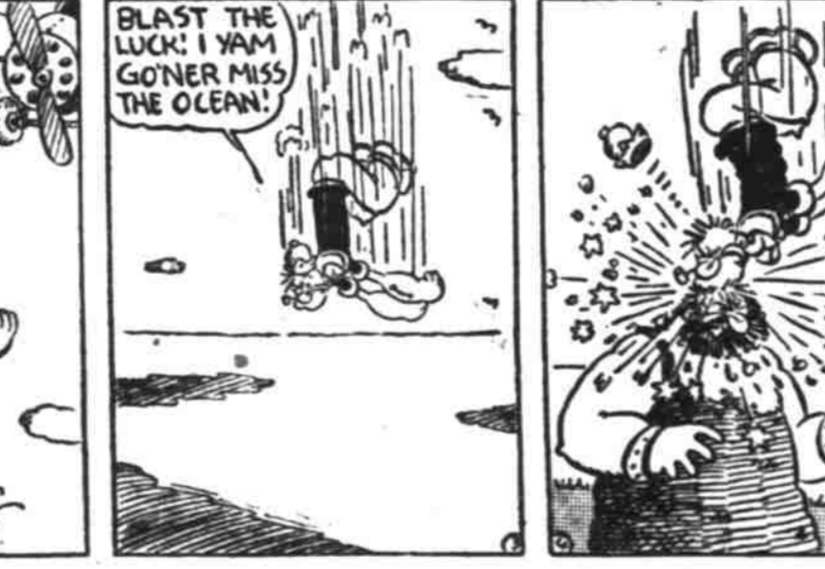
