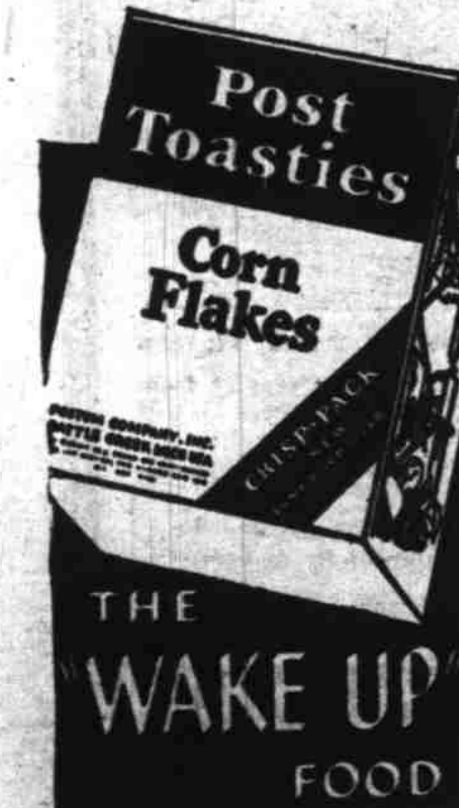

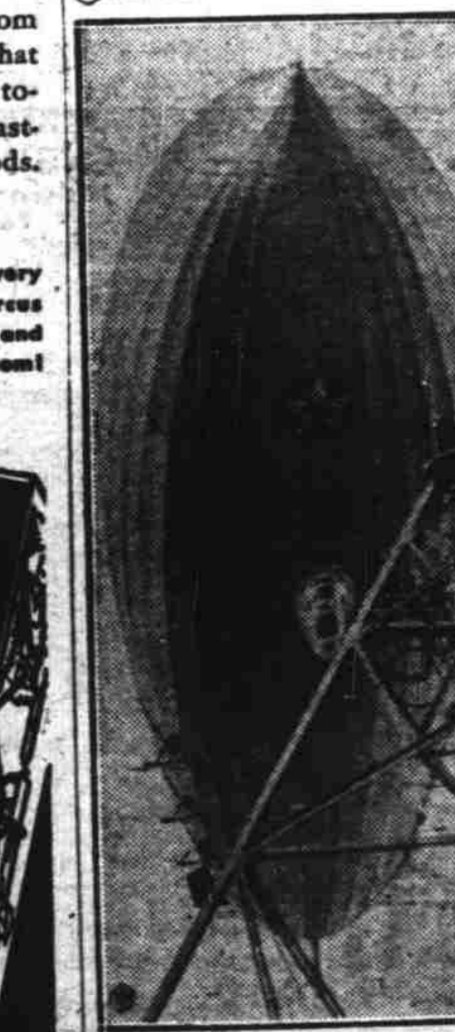
### ATTEND FERRIN FUNERAL
