went to San Francisco, where he practiced law.

Samuel L. Simpson died in Portland June 14, 1906. He had written much fine poetry, shot through with the fire of his genius—struck from the same mould from which came the brilliant attainments of his cousin a few times removed, the great leader of the Union forces.

General Grant had something of the same divine fire in his soul, for the world was surprised to find the masterpiece when, after his death, the book of his Memoirs was published, and quickly achieved a sale in total copies reaching one of the highest points in history up to that time.

The greatest surprise was the writing ability shown by the general. He himself had not realized his genius in that line, and no one else had suspected it. The last chapters, and in fact most of
