Banning Beer
Not Serious Proposal
Reports that businessmen, finding themselves unable legally to sell 3.2 beer, might demand enforcement of the city liquor ordinance to the letter, thereby banning "near beer," were not given much credence at the meeting last night. That the ordinance does, actually, forbid the sale of "near beer" was not denied, however, although it was believed the law would not cover malted milk drinks.
Time has not been set for the trial of Kahle in municipal court on a charge of selling beer. He is now at liberty on \$100 bail.
Petitions were being drafted yesterday urging the city council to enact a bill legalizing the sale of beer in the city. It was reported. Arguments were made for it being sold just across the city limits, the business was being taken from local merchants and possible revenue from the city.
Restaurants and shops with stocks of 3.2 beer on hand continued selling the beverage yesterday under cover of the court order.

HOUSING Y.M., Y.W. JOINTLY IS TALKED

An informal meeting of representatives of the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. was held yesterday noon at the Y.M.C.A. to consider problems of joint work, and to study whether the work of the two organizations could be consolidated in the Y.M.C.A. building. A subcommittee was named to make further studies into the matter. Changes might have to be made in the Y building, and whether such would be practical is one question to be examined. The Y.W.C.A. has maintained offices, restroom and dormitory for women in the Roth building for several years and has rendered valuable service to working women, transient women, and high school girls.

WILLAMETTE ENTRY IN CORVALLIS MEET

CORVALLIS, May 11.—(AP)—With entry lists in from three Willamette valley colleges and at least one more expected, the first invitational Oregon track meet at Oregon State college Saturday is expected to bring together the largest group of collegiate track men here in years.
For the first time in recent years the Oregon State varsity and freshmen teams will match paces with trackmen from Willamette and Pacific universities and Monmouth Normal school, and possibly with Linfield college.
All visiting teams have groups of stars expected to press the local men for honors. A reduction in budgets which limited Coast conference dual meets led to the scheduling of this all-state meet, which met, officials here said, with instant popularity.
