**MEET OF HIGHWAY BOARD POSTPONED**

The meeting of the state highway commission scheduled to be held in Portland next Wednesday has been postponed indefinitely, it was announced at the state highway department yesterday. It had been proposed to award contracts aggregating an expenditure of \$125,000 at this meeting. Included in these contracts were two bridges estimated to cost \$50,000 and ciling operations involving an expenditure of more than \$75,000. One of the proposed bridges would span Mill creek in Polk county, while the other would span the north Santiam river in Linn county. Officials said that a conference of the highway commissioners probably would be held preceding the next public meeting for the purpose of considering certain federal road projects under the public works bill now before congress.

**MOTOR PERMITS TO GO OUT ON JUNE 15**

Temporary motor vehicle permits for the period July 1, 1932, to January 1, 1934, will be released by mail or at the various registration offices on June 15. Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, announced in a letter sent to all car owners in Oregon yesterday. The rate on private passenger cars is \$5 for the six months period, regardless of weight. Cars again will be licensed next January with a \$5 fee covering the entire year 1934. All applications for licenses covering the last six months of the year 1933 on file in the office of the secretary of state on May 27, will be included in the drawing for low license numbers to be held on that date. The practice of eliminating assignments of special numbers, adopted two years ago, to expedite the release of plates, will be followed again this season, Hoss announced.
