AGED VETERAN WINS DECREE OVER NOTE

Bundy to Keep \$2000 Note, Counter Claim Against Endicott Allowed

In a decree for Clarkson Bundy, 90-year-old Civil war veteran, Judge L. G. Lewelling yesterday held E. M. Endicott, local attorney, was not entitled to return of a \$2000 promissory note given Bundy in 1929. The court at the same time upheld Bundy's counter-claim and allowed him to claim a judgment for \$2000 against Endicott, pending settlement of the note.

Endicott started the action when Bundy refused to return the note to him at the same time retaining possession of two \$1000 Republic of Columbia bonds. Endicott claimed that the note was in the nature of an interim certificate held by Bundy while the bonds were being purchased and that delivery of the bonds to Bundy closed the transaction and made it mandatory for Bundy to return the bonds to Endicott.

Bundy held that he had merely loaned Endicott a \$2000 taking the two South American bonds as security and that the obligation of \$2000 was still in effect.

Judge Lewelling said the evidence of the transaction was rather incomplete and that undoubtedly some confusion existed between Endicott and Bundy, both hard of hearing and somewhat casual in their business relations. The court, however, held that the burden of proof was with Endicott and claimed that he had not made a conclusive proof of a sale of bonds by him to Bundy, rather than a two-year loan, secured by the bonds.

When Endicott first asked for the return of the bonds they were quoted at \$675 each. The present market quotation is about \$225 each.

Title Quieted — Title to the property owned by the Northwest Fruit Products company on South Commercial and Trad streets has been quieted by a decree issued Tuesday in circuit court here to S. R. Stevenson of Eugene who bought the property at tax sale. Stevenson is understood to have brought the suit to provide himself with a merchantable title in a pending deal in which the property may pass to persons interested in making a brewery out of the structure.

KIWANIS OBJECTIVE DISCUSSED TUESDAY
Departure From Golden Rule Unnecessary, Harry V. Collins Asserts

The six fundamental objectives of the Kiwanis organization were carefully discussed and enlarged upon Tuesday noon in an impromptu talk to the members of that group here by Harry Collins, substituting for Frank Lonergan, Portland attorney, who was unable to fill his speaking date.

Collins, manager of this district of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, said Kiwanis would fall if it did not exemplify in the lives of its members the objectives for which it was founded. He outlined as needed Kiwanis motives spiritual emphasis in all life's relationships, application of the golden rule as a law of conduct, improved ethics in business and professional life, improved citizenship on the part of all Kiwanians, increased friendliness between citizens of a community and development of a sane, helpful community spirit.

"We have heard much recently of the departure from the golden rule is a standard from which no one needs to depart," E. V. Blair of McMinnville headed a group from that city which asked a large attendance of Salem Kiwanians at an inter-city all-day meet to be held Saturday, May 27, in McMinnville. The conference during the day will be followed by a dinner, dance and entertainment at night. The district governor of Kiwanis is expected to attend.

RECALL PETITIONS OUT AT SILVERTON
Kleinsorge and Duncan Target of Move Over School Affairs

SILVERTON, May 16. — Petitions seeking recall of two Silverton school board members, Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge and R. B. Duncan, were placed in circulation here today. Another set of petitions seeks to place up for election June 19 four men, Ike Worden, H. B. Jorgensen, A. J. Lathens and Ernest Boesch.

The petitions were drawn by Lars Bergvik of Salem, attorney for the recall committee.

Lack of economies in keeping with present needs is cited as reason for the attempted recall. The alleged failure to economize includes failure to reduce indebtedness, failure to pare down on hiring of employes, and failure to cut teachers' salaries in keeping with other class A districts. One specific reason given is the increasing of Superintendent Robert Goetz's salary to \$2700, after he had reduced it voluntarily from \$3600 to \$2400. When it was raised to \$2700, it was stipulated Goetz should serve as superintendent and principal.
