DECREE OVER NOTE DISCUSSED TUESDAY Bundy to Keep \$2000 Note, Departure From Golden Rule **Counter Claim Against** Unnecessary, Harry V. Endicott Allowed **Collins** Asserts The six fundamental objectives

Endicott started the action when Bundy refused to return the note to him at the same time retaining possession of two \$1000 Republic of Columbia bonds. Endicott claimed that the note was in the nature of an interim certificate held by Bundy while the bonds were being purchased and that delivery of the bonds to Bundy closed the transaction and made it mandatory for Bundy to return the bonds to Endicott.




