This action was taken because several members were planning to attend the northwest district conference at Victoria this coming week.

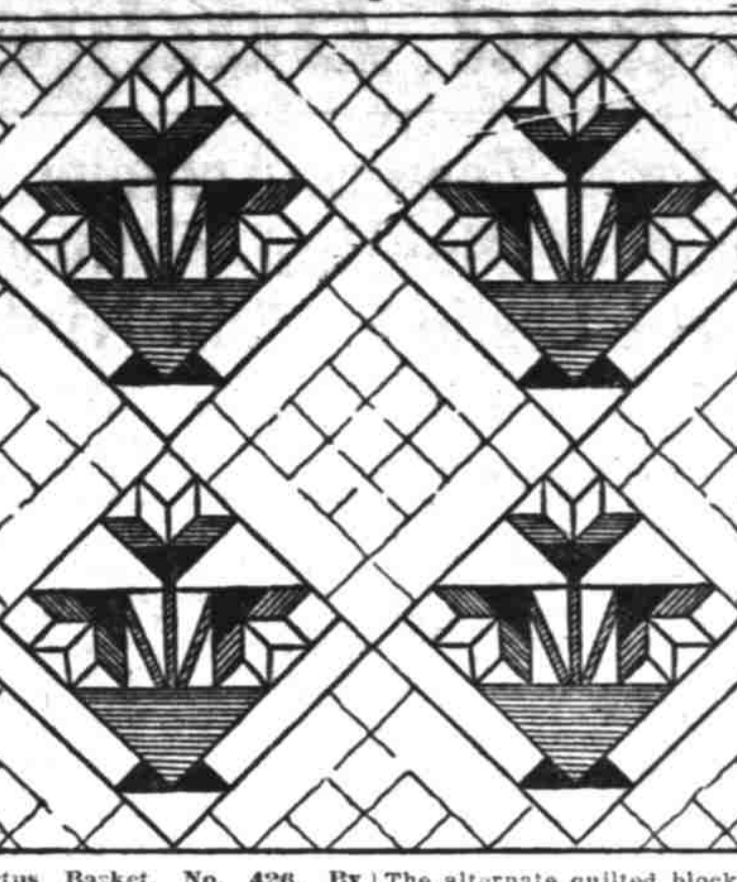
