Scotts Mills Seniors Slate Drama Friday

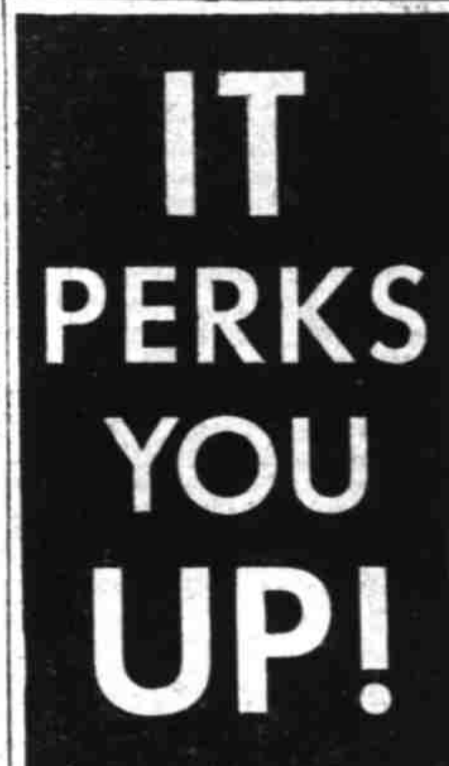

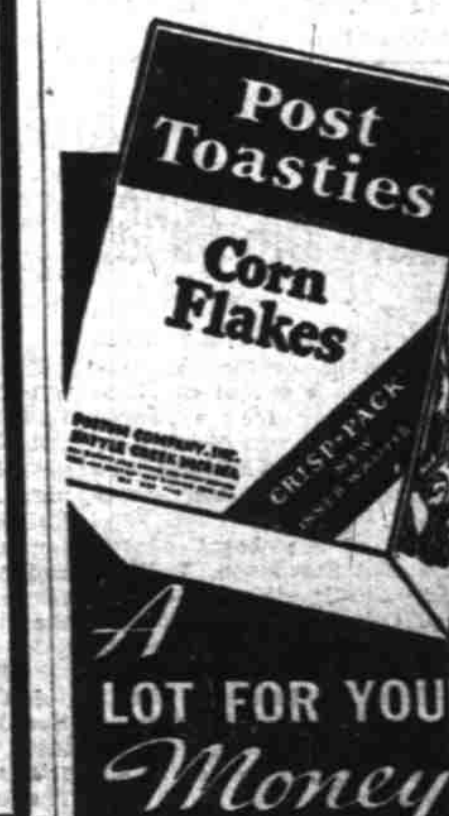
