Bearcats Lose to Pacific in Aquatic Meet on Track

Score 751/2-551/2 but W. U. Winner in six Events, Ties in Another

Willamette university's track team was impressive in the distance runs and in some of the field events, but lost to Pacific university 7.5 % to 55 % in a steady torrent of rain that made a travesty of the meet at Forest Grove Wednesday. Jumping and vaulting were all but impossible, Coach Vernon Gilmore reported. Willamette took six first places and tied for another while Pacific won seven first places and tied for one. Pacific mopped up a majority of seconds and thirds, but the meet might have been closer had not one of the Bearcat relay entries become ill.

The Bearcats swept both the mile and the two mile, but Pacific took all places in the high hurdles, and all but one point in the two dashes.

Saturday the Willamette team will hold a dual meet with Linfield at McMinnville, and a week from Saturday will engage in the Northwest conference at Forest






