Board Declines to act Further on School and City Council tax

SILVERTON, May 18—At a special meeting of the board of directors of the Silverton chamber of commerce held Thursday morning a resolution was passed to the effect that as far as the board of directors is concerned no further action will be taken in an attempt to reduce the tax budget for the city council and school board.

This morning's meeting was a continuation of one begun Wednesday night at which H. R. Irish,

chairman of the board of directors of the Silverton public schools was present and explained what reductions had been made in the expense of operating the Silverton schools and stated that the school board had made every effort to reduce the running expenses of the Silverton schools as requested by the board of directors of the chamber of commerce at a meeting held December 12, 1932, and still maintain a standard school.

The resolution passed at Thursday morning's meeting was approved by all directors except Alf O. Nelson, local attorney and chairman of the tax reduction committee of the chamber of commerce. Mr. Nelson recently presented one of the so-called "economy petitions" to the Silverton school board after its circulation in the district.

The resolution passed reads: "Be it resolved, that the board of directors of the Silverton chamber of commerce, having asked a previous meeting held December 12, 1932, that the school

board and city council reduce their next year's tax budget 25 per cent, had before them Mr. H. R. Irish, chairman and a member of the Silverton school board, and find that said board has reduced that part of the school budget over which they have control, about 20 per cent;

"Therefore, the board of directors of the chamber feel that its recommendations have been complied with as far as possible, and as far as said board of directors of the chamber of commerce is concerned no further action will be taken in this matter."

The motion to pass the resolution was made by M. G. Gundersen and seconded by R. A. Fish. Other members of the board present were Henry Alm, Dr. P. A. Loar, and George Hubbs. B. L. Starr, president, called for the vote.
