Of this total, 3,029 bales were sold by Oregon growers, 506 by Washington growers, and 954 by California growers. Sales in this 15-day period reduce the stocks in Oregon growers hands' to 4,601 bales; in Washington growers' hands to 1,-

766 bales; and California, 6,867 bales, of all ages. In Oregon, but 3,204 bales of the 1932 crop were still in growers' hands May 16. Stocks of other years on hand are: 1931, 1916; 1930, 76; 1929, 137; 1928, 168.






