

BEARCATS EAT ALBANY DUCKS

Pirates Walk Plank to Tune Of 17-0; W.U. Batsmen Fatten Averages

Willamette's Bearcats invited the Albany college ball tossers to a duck feed on Olinger field Thursday afternoon and the Pirates brought the ducks. Willamette won 17 to 0. Three Albany pitchers yielded 14 hits and their mistakes committed eight errors. Gordon Williams took the route on the mound for Willamette, allowing seven hits. He walked seven men but received perfect support to turn in a shutout.

The Pirates were especially shy of accuracy in throwing to the bases and the Bearcats staged a track meet in the fourth inning, scoring five runs before the Pirate got anybody out. If several balls hadn't been hit high in the air, that inning might not have been finished yet.

Ones, Pemberton, Gribble, Manning, Moye and Egelston of the Bearcats fattened their batting averages, the first two mentioned getting three hits each. Coach "Spec" Keene sent in all of his reserves in the last two innings.

"Public Schools Protective League" Candidates for County Board Named

A mass meeting of taxpayers residing in non-high school territory was held last night in the chamber of commerce rooms to propose names of candidates to be voted on in the school election next month in compliance with the law of the last legislature. The name of Public Schools Protective League was adopted by the body, and the object as expressed by those present was that to protect education as well as the taxpayers the provision of bus transportation should be discontinued under present conditions.

Officers elected were E. S. Porter, Silverton, chairman, and Ronald Jones, Brooks, secretary. The candidates proposed for the June election are: Zone one, Michael Wehnacht, Woodburn, McKee school district; zone two, Ellis Stevens, North Howell; zone three, none decided; zone four, Ernest Warner, Central Howell; zone five, Eugene Finlay, Jefferson, Looney Butte school.

GROWER HOP SALES TOTAL 4489 BALES

Nearly 4,500 bales of hops, or an exact 4,489, moved from growers' stock on the coast in the first 15 days of this month, according to figures compiled yesterday by Henry Cornoyer, secretary of the state hop growers' association.

Of this total, 3,029 bales were sold by Oregon growers, 506 by Washington growers, and 954 by California growers. Sales in this 15-day period reduce the stocks in Oregon growers' hands to 4,601 bales; in Washington growers' hands to 1,748 bales; and California, 6,867 bales, of all ages. In Oregon, but 3,204 bales of the 1932 crop were still in growers' hands May 16. Stocks of other years on hand are: 1931, 101,616; 1930, 76; 1929, 137; 1928, 168.

CITIES BENEFIT BY RELIEF ACTIVITIES

Municipalities in Marion county, as well as the county itself, are benefiting from the R. F. C. unemployment program, information given yesterday by County Commissioner Roy Nelson shows.

An average of 11 workmen is being supplied to Salem, 17 to Stayton and 11 will be sent to Silverton by the county on Monday. At Stayton, relief crews have graded several of the back streets in preparation for graveling, and improved drainage over the town. Men are now at work clearing and leveling Leslie junior high school grounds here and from 10 to 12 have been doing cleanup and repair work at the state fairgrounds for the past two weeks.

"This work does not conflict with regular labor," Nelson declared. "It is work that would not be done by the towns themselves. We will send crews to the other towns if they want them. They must supply the foremen, tools and working materials."

Building Permits Totals Running Above Last Week

With two business days remaining, this week's building permits already have nearly doubled those of last week when nine permits with a total value of \$67,500 were issued. Permits to date number eight and total \$128,500 in value. Four are for new construction to cost \$335 and four for repairs and alterations to cost \$950.

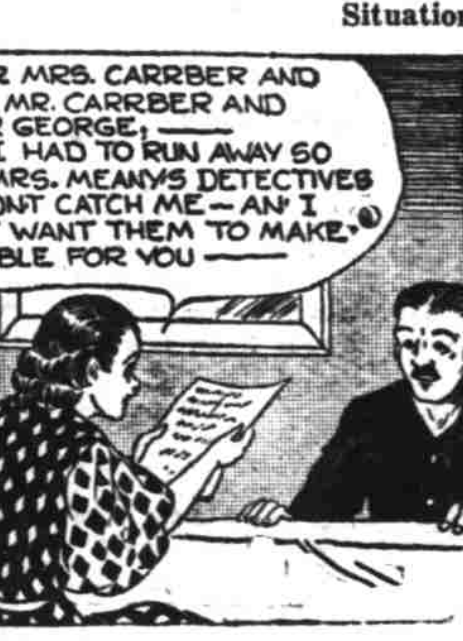
