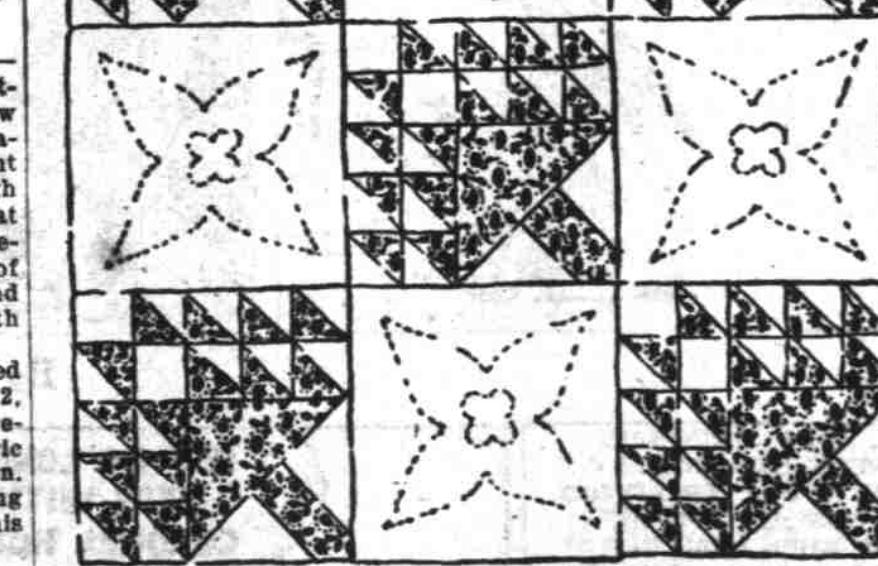

The United States abounds in pine trees from coast to coast. The predominance of this tree in the colony caused its extensive use as a symbol in flags and later in state seals. It is no wonder, then, that the Colonial needlewoman plied her scraps of material to form a patchwork picture of a pine tree. This pattern was not limited to any state or section, but appeared in all the 13 states. Its popularity was well deserved, and has continued until today, because it is a simple block to make, and an effective quilt when finished.

The pattern comes to you with complete simple instructions for cutting, sewing and finishing, together with yardage chart, diagram of quilt to help arrange the blocks for single and double bed size, quilting motif, and a diagram of block which serves as a guide for placing the patches and suggests contrasting materials.
