CONFIDENCE VOTE IN BANK IS MADE

WOODBURN, May 19-(Special)-A vote of confidence and appreciation for the Bank of merce this week, and a committee of W. H. Broyles, R. L. Guiss and John Shaw named to aid in a bet-

ter public understanding on the banking situation locally, The Bank of Woodburn this week issued a statement signed by Keith Powell, president, involving

six points, four of which are: "Our trouble is depreciation in the values of our bond account. These bonds, both Oregon municipals and market bonds, because of the lack of market in these trying times, cannot be sold for the price we gave for them. We have some frozen loans as well, and some losses, but this is secondary.

"The present ownership cannot furnish bonds or property sufficient to make up this depreciation. We have in the past year or two contributed voluntarily more than our entire capital and surplus and we are now throwing in our remaining properties, but their values also are depreciated and cannot entirely compensate.

"We are living within our income. Expenses have been cut to the bone. The writer is off the payroll and all remaining salaries are greatly reduced. We can continue these economies .

"We are willing to step aside for any responsible group who can organize, purchase our acceptable assets and carry on, the remainder to be liquidated slowly so bonds need not be sacrificed. We are working with substantial interests who may be willing to do this."

White School Has Graduation Event For Six Students


White school had its graduating exercises Thursday night, Avery Thompson of Salem was the speaker.

Miss Mathilda Gilles who is the teacher has been reelected for next year which will be her sixth year. She and her pupils had an all day picnic at the school house Friday.


