Meeting Called Monday at Chamber of Commerce: Tax Said Exorbitant

Common problems confronting wood haulers, gravel haulers and other truck agents and owners as a result of the new truck legislation going into effect shortly will be discussed at a meeting at the chamber of commerce Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, W. F.

"The cost of operating trucks under this law will be prohibitive; so far as the wood and gravel truck owners are concerned, the driving, at State and Commercial trucks will simply have to be laid up under the new law as it will be impossible to operate under such exhorbitant charges," Mr. Brown says.

"If this law is enforced the towns and cities of the state will be without fuel supplies and hundreds of people who are making only a bare living now with their Special showing of graduation trucks will be deprived of a means of livelthood," Mr. Brown states. Price of fuel will have to be raised to cover the greatly increased cost of hauling, which will probably mean a \$2 per cord increase in wood, Mr. Brown
