

Etzel's Homer Gives Parrish Final Victory Over Leslie

IS ONLY BREAK IN MOUND DUEL

Serdotz Allows one Blow, Browning six; Fielding Good, Both Teams

A home run by Etzel, bringing in Ramp and Damon ahead of him, provided the only scoring as Parrish defeated Leslie in the final game of the annual junior high baseball series, 3 to 0 on Olney field Monday afternoon.

Serdotz, Parrish hurler, let Leslie down with one hit and Browning allowed only six, not more than one in any inning; and both teams played tight ball, making an exceptional showing on their season's work considering that both Coach Halk of Parrish and Coach Fletcher of Leslie started the season without any of last year's regular players.

Serdotz struck out 11 batsmen and Browning five. Serdotz pitched his best game of the season, giving only one free pass; Browning's control was good also, but he happened to walk two men just before Etzel came through with his homer.

Curry hit Leslie's lone single. Etzel got three hits for Parrish and Aker two.

The victory clinched for Parrish the secondary school championship of the city, contested for in a three-way series in which Sacred Heart academy also figured.

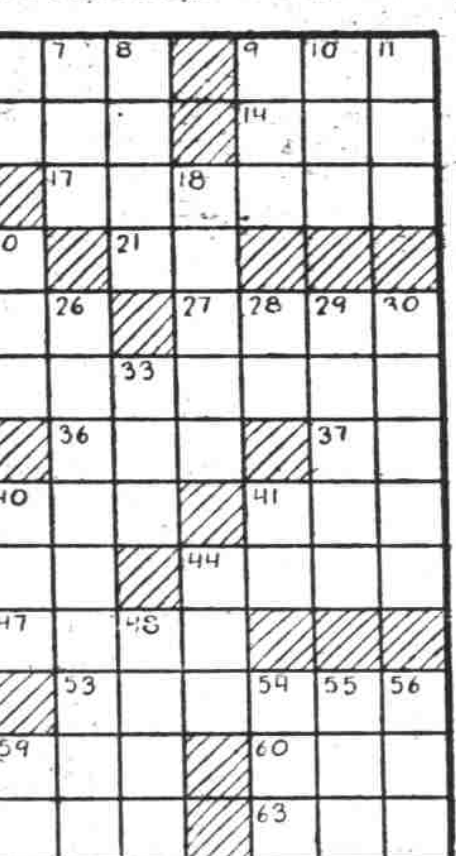
Oregon Normal Beats Webfoot; Koch is Slugger

GIRLS' TITLE GOES TO INDEPENDENCE

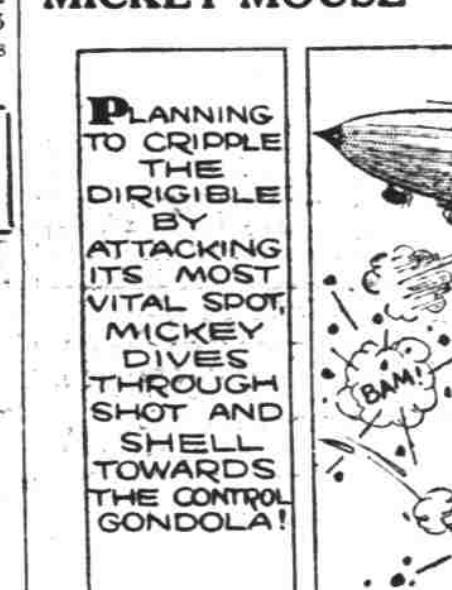
