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TRUCK MEN ABANDON REFERENDUM ON TAX

Injunction Action Likely; Movement Against tax Act Spreading

Definite rejection of a referendum move to invoke enactment of the new regulatory truck act was taken by the executive committee of the Truck Owners and Farmers' Protective association, in session here Wednesday morning.

The move against the new act will probably take the form of an injunction, though this will be further discussed at an executive board meeting Thursday night and a mass meeting Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the chamber of commerce.

A. C. Anderson, chairman of the Salem unit of the truck owners and farmers group, formed only Monday of this week, has already received long distance calls from 50 points interested in joining the state-wide organization to fight the bus and truck tax. Three additional units, at Falls City, Belmar and Corvallis, have already been formed.

Referendum action against the truck regulatory law is not practical because it requires at least 10 days to prepare heading for the referendum, and that amount of time does not yet remain, it was pointed out at yesterday's meeting.

Officials emphasize that objections brought against the regulatory truck act are not based largely on mileage costs for the registration fee permits liability in addition to one cent gas tax, effective June 10, and three-fourths mill per capacity ton, empty or loaded.

An additional 150 farmers and small truck owners have signified their intention of enlisting in the Salem group, bringing the total to nearly 300 since Monday.

BUSINESS METHODS CHANGED IN CHINA

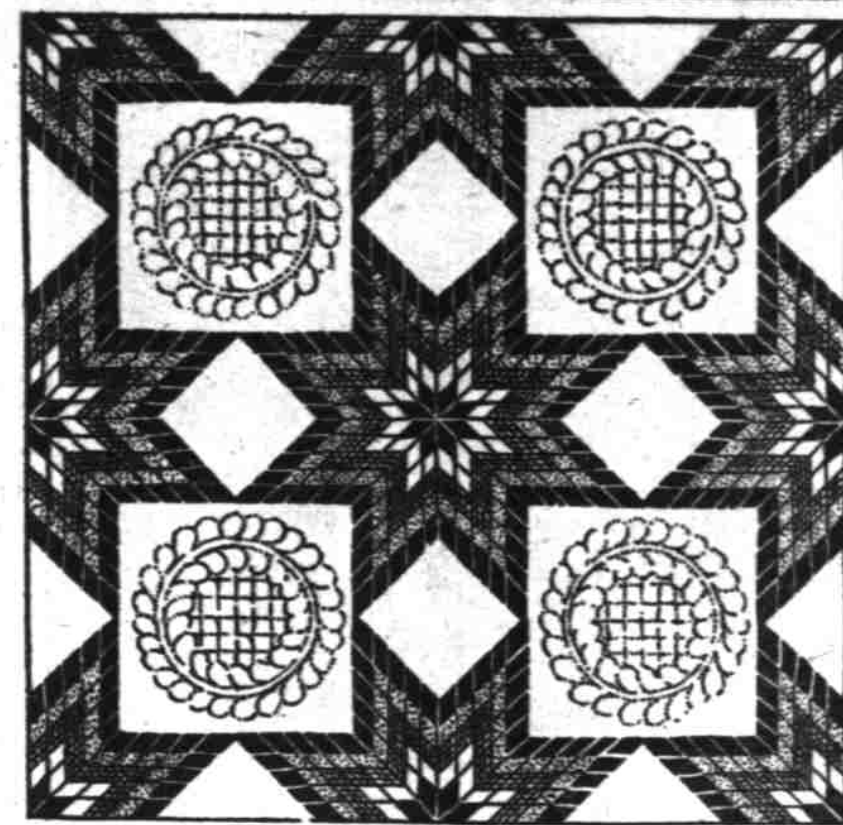
Business as it is conducted in Salem, and especially Shanghai, was discussed for the Salem Retail Credit association yesterday noon by Dr. J. Vinton Scott, who was himself engaged in business in the Oriental metropolis.

Before western business men and methods invaded China, business deals were handled much in the manner of an afternoon tea, with a social tete-a-tete primary to the business transaction; no money was placed on the order and the Chinaman's word to pay was literally as good as his bond.

Entrance of western business men and methods has changed the situation, and now the Chinese meet the foreigner on his own ground in the business realm, Dr. Scott said, with result that business methods are much the same as here.

The Chinese place great stress on payment of obligations before the Chinese New Year's, and devious are the methods by which the Chinaman contrives to pay bills before that date, in order to avoid actual "loss of face."
