

GARAT STARS WITH GAYNOR AT GRAND

Paired in "Adorable," Film Opening Today; Garat Fulfills Ambition

Henry Garat, young international screen star, fulfilled a five-year ambition when he came to Hollywood to co-star with Janet Gaynor in "Adorable" for Fox Film, to be seen at the Grand today.

"Five years ago in Paris," he said, "I saw that beautiful picture, '7th Heaven,' in which Janet Gaynor and Charles Farrell became famous. I fell in love with the petite little Diane of the picture, and I said to myself then: 'Some day I am going to be that girl's leading man—and kiss her!'"

During the five years, Garat became a great favorite in musical comedy, playing an extended engagement on Broadway in "Paris Nights," and then returned to Europe to become the most popular male screen star on the continent.

Now he is playing opposite Miss Gaynor in "Adorable," and if he kisses her during the love scenes with a little more fervor than might be expected from a leading man, we may smile at the romantic young Frenchman who made a seemingly impossible vow five years ago.

Wilhelm Dieterle directed "Adorable," which also has Herbert Mundin, C. Aubrey Smith and Blanche Friderici in its supporting cast.

HARLOW AND GABLE HERE IN 'RED DUST'

"Red Dust," opening today at the Hollywood theatre, presents the interesting combination of Clark Gable and Jean Harlow in a turbulent story of Cochise, China. The picture is based on a dramatic triangle which results when the aristocratic wife of a French engineer visits a tropical rubber plantation and falls in love with its overseer, thus engendering the hatred of a defiant, hard-boiled girl of the dance hall variety, who has prior claims on the man.

Gable has the role of the overseer, a part totally different from his recent successful portrayal opposite Norma Shearer in "Strange Intercourse." Miss Harlow, fresh from her triumph in "Red Headed Woman," plays the hardened plantation girl who, though scorned at first, subsequently proves that sufficient sex appeal and strength to live the brutal life of the tropics give her an indisputable advantage over her more civilized rival. Mary Astor is seen as the engineer's wife, and Gene Raymond as her husband.

PIGBOATS PICTURED IN ELSINORE FILM

"Hell Below" is Sensational Submarine Drama Taken With Navy's aid

"Hell Below," Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's sensational drama of submarine adventure, with Robert Montgomery, Walter Houston, Madge Evans, Jimmy Durante, Eugene Pallette and Robert Young heading the cast, is the attraction coming today to the Elsinore theatre.

Based on the famous novel, "Pigboats," by Commander Edward Ellisberg, the picture unfolds a stirring romance amid the thrills of submarine fighting, torpedoing of destroyers, the destruction of an armed Italian town and other spectacular incidents which have caused the photoplay to be referred to as "The Big Parade of the Ocean."

Jack Conway directed "Hell Below," most of which was filmed with actual submarines at the Pearl Harbor naval base at Honolulu.

HEFFRON ACTION IS EYED AS TEST CASE

The action of F. C. Heffron of Eugene in filing as a delegate to the Oregon repeal convention as a dry, regardless of the mandate of the voters of Lane county at the special election July 21, was accepted by officials here as a preliminary move on the part of certain anti-repeal groups to test the constitutionality of the law authorizing the convention in the courts.

Heffron's filing was rejected by the secretary of state on the ground that he failed to conform to the pledge contained in the certificate. His filing indicated that he would vote dry regardless of the outcome of the vote in his county at the special election.

The law authorizing the constitutional convention provides that delegates shall vote in the same manner as the majority of voters in their county on the repeal of the eighteenth amendment. This pledge was changed by Heffron in his filing.

Dave O'Hara, election official in the state department, said that he expected Heffron to file proceedings in the courts to compel the secretary of state to accept his filing.

Reports received here indicated that Heffron represents a group of dries, and that he changed the pledge in his filing certificate for the purpose of carrying the issue to the courts. In case Heffron contests the action of the state department other questions probably will be involved in the proceeding.

New Scarlet Fever Case is Reported

Another of the sporadic cases of scarlet fever which have broken out in Salem every few weeks this year was discovered Thursday by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer. The latest to suffer from the disease is a seven-year Englewood school pupil, who has a mild case. The health staff checked up on the case at the school and reported no fear of a spread of the disease.
