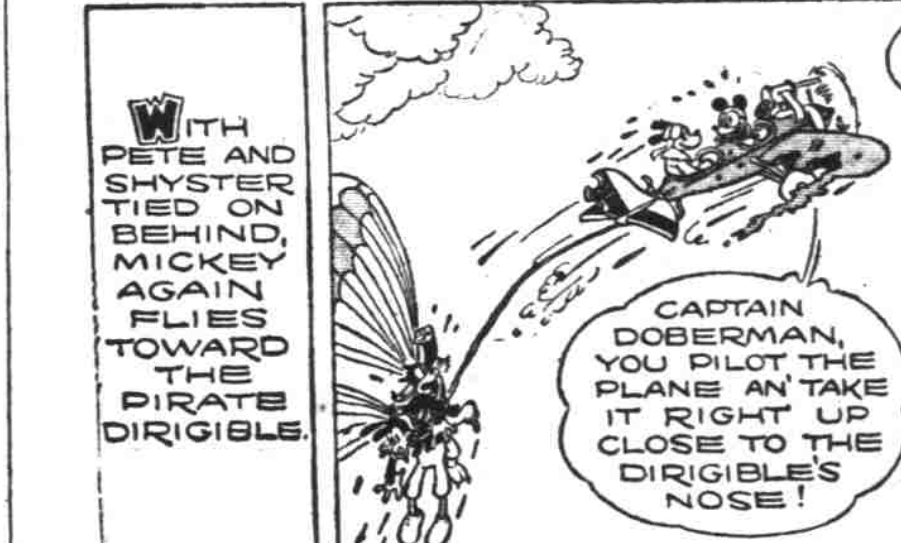

## Dempsey to Profit From Ring Battle

NEW YORK, June 5.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey's spurge into the metropolitan fight promotion field with the 15-round battle between Max Baer and Max Schmeling Thursday at the Yankee Stadium, appeared today to be pointed toward financial success.

"Gosh, it's awful," the old champion gasped, wiping the perspiration from his face as he tried to find preferred places for late comers in ringside pews entirely sold out. "The first 10 rows should be made of rubber. I'm making enemies by the minute."

As his two gladiators took their ease in training camps, the major grind of physical preparation complete, customers filed steadily past Dempsey's ticket windows.

Dempsey said he had \$100,000 in cash, with another \$50,000 in reservations. Apparently \$8,000 will see the tussle with gate receipts around \$300,000. Dempsey's top ticket price is \$10, compared with \$25 for the best ringside seats at the Sharkey-Schmeling match, which drew \$450,000 last June.

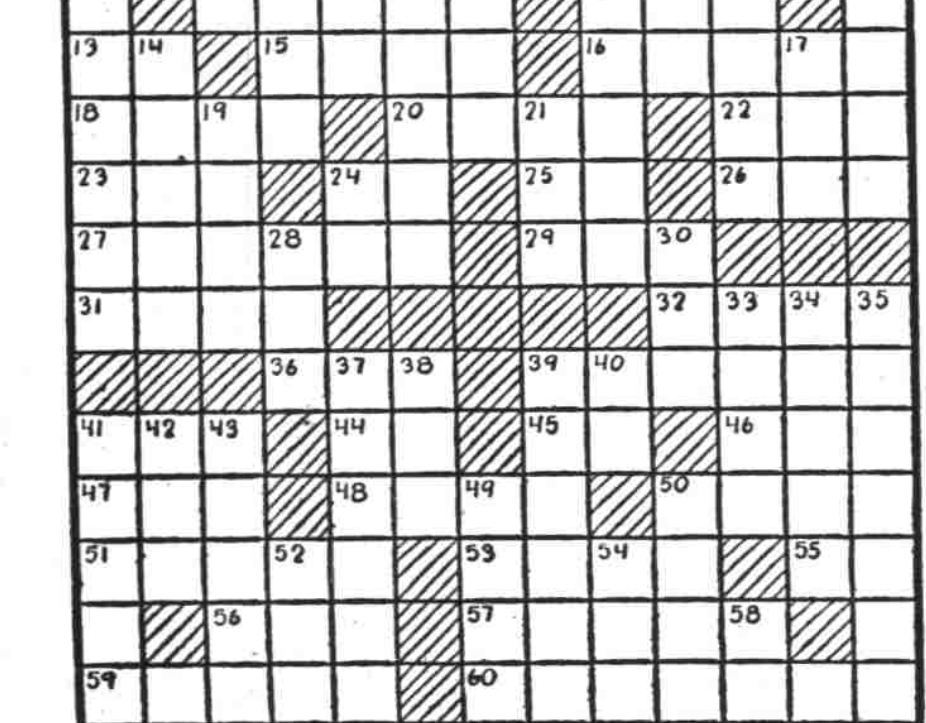
