NEW YORK, June 5.—(AP)—Stocks swung back into the advance today after some uncertainty as to whether Saturday's setback had signaled the beginning of a reaction that really meant business.

Sales totaled 5,010,296 shares. Chemical stocks boomed upward under inspiration of a brisk advance by Allied.

At the close, Western Union was up 9/16; Homestake, Allied Chemical and Armour of Illinois preferred, 6.

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HEAT WAVE TURNS GRAINS UPWARD LOCAL BERRIES REACH MARKETS

Spring Wheat Suffers; Prematurely Ripens Winter Wheat

CHICAGO, June 5.—(AP)—Sizzling temperatures inflicting damage to winter wheat in Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma turned all grain prices sharply upward in today.

Contributing to the rise of values was the first complaint from spring wheat territory, South Dakota points sending word that immediate rains were needed to prevent serious losses.

Wheat closed stronger, 1-1/4 above Saturday's finish, corn 1/4 advanced, oats 1/4 up.

Berry Pool Brings Top Price, 5 1/2c

The Sublimity strawberry pool, bids on which were opened Saturday, sold at 5 1/2 cents per pound to Starr Fruit Products company and Paulus Bros. cannery...

About 400 acres, including some from the Silvertown Hills and Union Hills district, are represented in the pool.

Five canners bid for the pool, including Cleary and Hillman, R. D. Bedie, Baker Kelly, Starr and Paulus.

Small sized broilers were playing havoc with general quotations on all small fowls in the local live chicken trade.

Practically all last week's arrivals in the country killed meat trade were cleaned up and the current week starts with a clean slate and most steady values.

Further showing of strength was suggested all through the Dollars from Banks were quoted \$2.60 and new Oregon \$2.75 with a few larger sized selections \$3 while California were \$1.55-\$2 rate.

Downey mildew is appearing, report

Downey mildew, destructive pest of hop vines, has put in its appearance and is forcing the growers to start spraying to combat the disease.

The mildew flourishes in damp weather which is not too cold. In May while the rains were heavy little mildew was observed because the temperatures were relatively low.

With warmer days the mildew is coming out. It plays swift havoc on the vines, stopping their growth at the top.

Henry Crawford brought in some specimens of vines from the St. Paul district showing that the mildew had gotten a good start.

The disease is reported in other districts, but farmers are getting busy at once to save their vines.
