#### Crop to be Shriveled. Light Weight is Expert Belief

CHICAGO, June 6-(AP)-Responding to forecasts of cooler weather, wheat prices underwent something of a setback late to-

day. The downturn of values came after values earlier had averaged higher, influenced by the fact this was the fourth successive day in scorching temperatures southwest and west, with the mercury in some cases breaking the top record. Crop experts expressed belief that shriveled and light-weight wheat would constitute a large

part of the 1933 harvest. Wheat closed nervous, 4-% under yesterday's finish, corn 1/4-% down, oats ¼-% advanced, Today's closing quotations:

Wheat: July, 73-73 %; Sept., 74 %-75; Dec., 77 %-%. Corn: July, 44 1/4; Sept., 46-%-47; Dec., 49%. Oats: , July, 25; Sept., 25 %-26; Dec., 27%.

France and Italy will produce cherries sufficient for the brine demand this year, and as a result exporters expect little business from the United States, according to wire received by the federal agriculture bureau from Agricultural Attache N. I. Nielsen at Marseilles. The message follows:

"Cherries, fresh, total production this year expected to be larger than last year in Italy, but ir France total production this year expected to be about equal to last year. Quantity of cherries to be placed in brine in Italy probably slightly above last year, but in France a little less, with total for two countries about same as 1932. This quantity of brined cherries sufficient for demand, and exporters again expect little business

from the United States. "Present quotations, cost, insurance, and freight, New York in cents per pound new crop French cherries in brine, first quality, stemmed and pitted, 18 to 22 millimeters 6.9c. New crop Italian cherries in brine Prima, whole, stemmed and pitted 18-29 millimeters 8.4c."
